This decision is based on our finding from:
 Washington State law which directs that the true and fair market value of property shall be based upon sales of the subject property, or sales of comparable properties, made within the past five years, cost, cost less depreciation, reconstruction cost less depreciation, or capitalization of income. "True and fair" value is market value; that is, the price to be paid by a willing buyer to a willing seller.

Washington State law further stipulates that the assessment determined by the County Assessor is presumed to be correct and can only be overcome by presentation of clear, cogent and convincing evidence that the value is incorrect.

The issue before the Board is the January 1, 2015, true and fair market value. A hearing was held on March 10, 2016 before the Board of Equalization. The appellant, Paul Glasco, was not in attendance at the hearing and the Assessor's office was represented by Penny Womack.

The Assessor valued the property at \$429,240 for the 2015 assessment year. The owners appealed, asserting a value of \$362,200.


The subject property is located at 16208 Rd. 6 SE, Warden, Washington. Subject property is 10.8 acre parcel with a single family residence, pool & pool house, shop and machine shed. A small amount has wheel line irrigation.

The appellant stated the reason for the appeal was an unusual increase. Mr. Glasco also included his Change of Value Notice letter dated Sept. 17, 2014. No additional information was received from the appellant.

The assessor representative submitted information the board and the appellant. This information included aerial neighborhood map, aerial map of the parcel, exterior photos of the residence, pool house, shop and machine shed, exhibit #1 suburban acreage sales, exhibit #2 shows photos of sales, and exhibit #3 is a map showing the location of sales. 4 acres is farmed and assessed at \$4,200/acre.

The Board finds the arguments presented by the appellant are not substantial enough to meet the clear, cogent, and convincing standard of proof necessary to offset the presumption of correctness established under RCW 84.40.0301. The Board finds the Assessor's Response to Real Property Petition dated February 10, 2016, which was mailed to the appellant and submitted as evidence in this hearing adequately reflect the subject's important value-related characteristics. Therefore, the Assessor's value is sustained at \$429,240, due to no support or information was received by the appellant, as stated, the last time this property was physically inspected was 2007 with no increase until the 2014 inspection cycle. The assessor is required to assess property based on market value.
