



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NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Sealed bids, plainly marked "**BID FOR FAIRGROUNDS PATH PROJECT, PHASE #1, CRP 14-04**", will be received by Grant County at the Office of the Board of County Commissioners located in the County Courthouse, P.O. Box 37, 35 C Street NW – Room 207, Ephrata, WA, 98823, until **1:50 P.M., Tuesday, July 8, 2014** and will then and there be opened and publicly read for the construction of the improvements.

All bid proposals shall be accompanied by a bid proposal deposit in cash, certified check, cashier's check, or surety bond in an amount equal to five percent (5%) of the amount of such bid proposal. No conditional bid bond will be accepted. Should the successful bidder fail to enter into such contract and furnish a satisfactory performance bond within the time stated in the specifications, the bid proposal deposit shall be forfeited to Grant County.

Maps, plans and specifications may be purchased from the office of the County Engineer, 124 Enterprise St. S.E., Ephrata, WA 98823, upon payment of the amount of \$25.00 (non-refundable).

Informational copies of the maps, plans and specifications are on file for inspection at the Grant County Public Works Building, 124 Enterprise St. S.E., Ephrata, WA 98823, and in various plan centers located in Washington.

The following is applicable to federal-aid projects: The Grant County Department of Public Works in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4 and Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the Department of Transportation issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively insure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises as defined at 49 CFR Part 26 will be afforded full opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, national origin, or sex in consideration for an award.



3 Standard Specifications for Road, Bridge, and Municipal Construction.

5 **AMENDMENTS TO THE STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS**

6

7 The following Amendments to the Standard Specifications are made a part of this contract and
8 supersede any conflicting provisions of the Standard Specifications. For informational
9 purposes, the date following each Amendment title indicates the implementation date of the
10 Amendment or the latest date of revision.

11

12 Each Amendment contains all current revisions to the applicable section of the Standard
13 Specifications and may include references which do not apply to this particular project.

14

15 **Section 1-02, Bid Procedures and Conditions**
16 **April 7, 2014**

17 **1-02.8(1) Noncollusion Declaration**

18 The third paragraph is revised to read:

19

20 Therefore, by including the Non-collusion Declaration as part of the signed bid Proposal,
21 the Bidder is deemed to have certified and agreed to the requirements of the Declaration.

23 **Section 1-03, Award and Execution of Contract**

24 **March 3, 2014**

25 **1-03.4 Contract Bond**

26 The last word of item 3 is deleted.

27

28 Item 4 is renumbered to 5.

29

30 The following is inserted after item 3 (after the preceding Amendments are applied):

32 4. Be conditioned upon the payment of taxes, increases, and penalties incurred on the
33 project under titles 50, 51, and 82 RCW; and

35 **Section 1-04, Scope of the Work**

36 **April 7, 2014**

37 **1-04.4 Changes**

38 In the third paragraph, item number 1 and 2 are revised to read:

- 40 a. When the character of the Work as altered differs materially in kind or nature from that
41 involved or included in the original proposed construction; or
42 b. When an item of Work, as defined elsewhere in the Contract, is increased in excess of
43 125 percent or decreased below 75 percent of the original Contract quantity. For the
44 purpose of this Section, an item of Work will be defined as any item that qualifies for
45 adjustment under the provisions of Section 1-04.6.

1 **Section 1-07, Legal Relations and Responsibilities to the Public**
2 **January 6, 2014**

3 **1-07.2 State Taxes**

4 This section is revised to read:

5
6 The Washington State Department of Revenue has issued special rules on the state sales
7 tax. Sections 1-07.2(1) through 1-07.2(3) are meant to clarify those rules. The Contracting
8 Agency will not adjust its payment if the Contractor bases a Bid on a misunderstood tax
9 liability.

10
11 The Contracting Agency may deduct from its payments to the Contractor, retainage or lien
12 the bond, in the amount the Contractor owes the State Department of Revenue, whether
13 the amount owed relates to the Contract in question or not. Any amount so deducted will be
14 paid into the proper State fund on the contractor's behalf. For additional information on tax
15 rates and application refer to applicable RCWs, WACs or the Department of Revenue's
16 website.

18 **1-07.2(1) State Sales Tax: Work Performed on City, County, or Federally-**
19 **Owned Land**

20 This section including title is revised to read:

22 **1-07.2(1) State Sales Tax: WAC 458-20-171 – Use Tax**

23 For Work designated as Rule 171, **Use Tax**, the Contractor shall include for compensation
24 the amount of any taxes paid in the various unit Bid prices or other Contract amounts.
25 Typically, these taxes are collected on materials incorporated into the project and items
26 such as the purchase or rental of; tools, machinery, equipment, or consumable supplies not
27 integrated into the project.

28
29 The Summary of Quantities in the Contract Plans identifies those parts of the project that
30 are subject to **Use Tax** under Section 1-07.2(1).

31
32 **1-07.2(2) State Sales Tax: Work on State-Owned or Private Land**

33 This section including title is revised to read:

34
35 **1-07.2(2) State Sales Tax: WAC 458-20-170 – Retail Sales Tax**

36 For Work designated as Rule 170, **Retail Sales Tax**, the Contractor shall collect from the
37 Contracting Agency, **Retail Sales Tax** on the full Contract price. The Contracting Agency
38 will automatically add this **Retail Sales Tax** to each payment to the Contractor and for this
39 reason, the Contractor shall not include the **Retail Sales Tax** in the unit Bid prices or in any
40 other Contract amount. However, the Contracting Agency will not provide additional
41 compensation to the Prime Contractor or Subcontractor for **Retail Sales Taxes** paid by the
42 Contractor in addition to the **Retail Sales Tax** on the total contract amount. Typically, these
43 taxes are collected on items such as the purchase or rental of; tools, machinery, equipment,
44 or consumable supplies not integrated into the project. Such sales taxes shall be included
45 in the unit Bid prices or in any other Contract amounts.

47 The Summary of Quantities in the Contract Plans identifies those parts of the project that
48 are subject to **Retail Sales Tax** under Section 1-07.2(2).

49
50 **1-07.2(3) Services**

51 This section is revised to read:

1 Any contract wholly for professional or other applicable services is generally not subject to
2 **Retail Sales Tax** and therefore the Contractor shall not collect **Retail Sales Tax** from the
3 Contracting Agency on those Contracts. Any incidental taxes paid as part of providing the
4 services shall be included in the payments under the contract.

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1 **SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

2
3 **INTRODUCTION**

4 The following Special Provisions are made a part of this contract and supersede any
5 conflicting provisions of the 2014 Standard Specifications for Road, Bridge and
6 Municipal Construction, and the foregoing Amendments to the Standard Specifications.

7
8 Several types of Special Provisions are included in this contract; General, Region,
9 Bridges and Structures, and Project Specific. Special Provisions types are
10 differentiated as follows:

- 14 and also notes a Project Specific Special Provision.

18 **General Special Provisions** are similar to Standard Specifications in that they typically
19 apply to many projects, usually in more than one Region. Usually, the only difference
20 from one project to another is the inclusion of variable project data, inserted as a "fill-in".

21
22 **Region Special Provisions** are commonly applicable within the designated Region.
23 Region designations are as follows:

35 **Bridges and Structures Special Provisions** are similar to Standard Specifications in

41 they were developed.

7 **1-01.3 Definitions**
8 *(March 8, 2013 APWA GSP)*
9

10 Delete the heading **Completion Dates** and the three paragraphs that follow it, and replace them
11 with the following:
12

13 **Dates**

14 ***Bid Opening Date***

15 The date on which the Contracting Agency publicly opens and reads the Bids.

16 ***Award Date***

17 The date of the formal decision of the Contracting Agency to accept the lowest
18 responsible and responsive Bidder for the Work.

19 ***Contract Execution Date***

20 The date the Contracting Agency officially binds the Agency to the Contract.

21 ***Notice to Proceed Date***

22 The date stated in the Notice to Proceed on which the Contract time begins.

23 ***Substantial Completion Date***

24 The day the Engineer determines the Contracting Agency has full and unrestricted use
25 and benefit of the facilities, both from the operational and safety standpoint, any
26 remaining traffic disruptions will be rare and brief, and only minor incidental work,
27 replacement of temporary substitute facilities, plant establishment periods, or correction
28 or repair remains for the Physical Completion of the total Contract.

29 ***Physical Completion Date***

30 The day all of the Work is physically completed on the project. All documentation
31 required by the Contract and required by law does not necessarily need to be furnished
32 by the Contractor by this date.

33 ***Completion Date***

34 The day all the Work specified in the Contract is completed and all the obligations of the
35 Contractor under the contract are fulfilled by the Contractor. All documentation required
36 by the Contract and required by law must be furnished by the Contractor before
37 establishment of this date.

38 ***Final Acceptance Date***

39 The date on which the Contracting Agency accepts the Work as complete.
40

41 Supplement this Section with the following:

43 All references in the Standard Specifications, Amendments, or WSDOT General Special
44 Provisions, to the terms "State" or "State of Washington" are changed to "Grant County,
45 Washington".
46

47 All references to "Department of Transportation", "Washington State Transportation
48 Commission", "Commission", "Secretary of Transportation", "Secretary", "Headquarters", and

1 "State Treasurer" shall be revised to read "Board of County Commissioners, Grant County,
2 Washington".

3
4 All references to "State Materials Laboratory" shall be revised to read "Grant County Public
5 Works Materials Laboratory, 124 Enterprise Street SE, Ephrata, WA. 98823".

6
7 All references to "final contract voucher certification" shall be interpreted to mean the final
8 payment form established by the Department of Public Works, Grant County, Washington.

9
10 The venue of all causes of action arising from the advertisement, award, execution, and
11 performance of the contract shall be in the Superior Court of Grant County, Washington.
12

13 **Additive**

14 A supplemental unit of work or group of bid items, identified separately in the Bid Proposal,
15 which may, at the discretion of the Contracting Agency, be awarded in addition to the base
16 bid.

18 **Alternate**

19 One of two or more units of work or groups of bid items, identified separately in the Bid
20 Proposal, from which the Contracting Agency may make a choice between different
21 methods or material of construction for performing the same work.
22

23 **Business Day**

24 A business day is any day from Monday through Friday except holidays as listed in Section
25 1-08.5.
26

27 **Contract Bond**

28 The definition in the Standard Specifications for "Contract Bond" applies to whatever bond
29 form(s) are required by the Contract Documents, which may be a combination of a Payment
30 Bond and a Performance Bond.
31

32 **Contract Documents**

33 See definition for "Contract".
34

35 **Contract Time**

36 The period of time established by the terms and conditions of the Contract within which the
37 Work must be physically completed.
38

39 **Notice of Award**

40 The written notice from the Contracting Agency to the successful Bidder signifying the
41 Contracting Agency's acceptance of the Bid Proposal.
42

43 **Notice to Proceed**

44 The written notice from the Contracting Agency or Engineer to the Contractor authorizing
45 and directing the Contractor to proceed with the Work and establishing the date on which
46 the Contract time begins.
47

48 **Traffic**

49 Both vehicular and non-vehicular traffic, such as pedestrians, bicyclists, wheelchairs, and
50 equestrian traffic.

13 awarded a public works project. The bidder must:

- 15 (a) At the time of bid submittal, have a certificate of registration in compliance
16 with chapter 18.27 RCW;
17 (b) Have a current state unified business identifier number;
18 (c) If applicable, have industrial insurance coverage for the bidder's employees
19 working in Washington as required in Title 51 RCW; an employment security
20 department number as required in Title 50 RCW; and a state excise tax
21 registration number as required in Title 82 RCW; and
22 (d) Not be disqualified from bidding on any public works contract under RCW
23 39.06.010 or 39.12.065(3).
24 (e) Bidders shall be qualified by experience, financing, equipment, and
25 organization to do the work called for in the Contract Documents. The
26 Contracting Agency reserves the right to take whatever action it deems
27 necessary to ascertain the ability of the bidder to perform the work
28 satisfactorily. The Contracting Agency's actions may include a pre-
29 qualification procedure prior to the bidder being furnished a proposal form on
30 any contract, or a pre-award survey of the bidder's qualifications prior to
31 award.

45 melting and mixing of alloys to create the material occurred in a foreign country.

46
47 Manufacturing begins with the initial melting and mixing, and continues through
48 the coating stage. Any process which modifies the chemical content, the
49 physical size or shape, or the final finish is considered a manufacturing process.
50 The processes include rolling, extruding, machining, bending, grinding, drilling,

1 welding, and coating. The action of applying a coating to steel or iron is deemed
2 a manufacturing process.
3 Coating includes epoxy coating, galvanizing, aluminizing, painting, and any other

5 the original reduction from ore to the finished product constitutes a manufacturing
6 process for iron.



1. Compliance with Regulations

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Overtime Codes

Overtime calculations are based on the hourly rate actually paid to the worker. On public works projects, the hourly rate must be not less than the prevailing rate of wage minus the hourly rate of the cost of fringe benefits actually provided for the worker.

- 1. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
 - B. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - C. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - D. The first two (2) hours before or after a five-eight (8) hour workweek day or a four-ten (10) hour workweek day and the first eight (8) hours worked the next day after either workweek shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All additional hours worked and all worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - E. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first eight (8) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other hours worked Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - F. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours worked, except Labor Day, shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Labor Day shall be paid at three times the hourly rate of wage.
 - G. The first ten (10) hours worked on Saturdays and the first ten (10) hours worked on a fifth calendar weekday in a four-ten hour schedule, shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of ten (10) hours per day Monday through Saturday and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - H. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions or equipment breakdown) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked Monday through Saturday over twelve (12) hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - I. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall also be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - J. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over ten (10) hours Monday through Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - K. All hours worked on Saturdays and Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - M. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

The employer shall have the sole discretion to assign overtime work to employees. Primary consideration for overtime work shall be given to employees regularly assigned to the work to be performed on overtime situations. After an employee has worked eight (8) hours at an applicable overtime rate, all additional hours shall be at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours or more.
 - B. The first four (4) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first twelve (12) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over twelve (12) hours Monday through Saturday, and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

(Regarding the Production of "Standard" or "Non-standard" Items)

Below is the department's (State L&I's) list of criteria to be used in determining whether a prefabricated item is "standard" or "non-standard". For items not appearing on WSDOT's predetermined list, these criteria shall be used by the Contractor (and the Contractor's subcontractors, agents to subcontractors, suppliers, manufacturers, and fabricators) to determine coverage under RCW 39.12. The production, in the State of Washington, of non-standard items is covered by RCW 39.12, and the production of standard items is not. The production of any item outside the State of Washington is not covered by RCW 39.12.

1. Is the item fabricated for a public works project? If not, it is not subject to RCW 39.12. If it is, go to question 2.
2. Is the item fabricated on the public works jobsite? If it is, the work is covered under RCW 39.12. If not, go to question 3.
3. Is the item fabricated in an assembly/fabrication plant set up for, and dedicated primarily to, the public works project? If it is, the work is covered by RCW 39.12. If not, go to question 4.
4. Does the item require any assembly, cutting, modification or other fabrication by the supplier? If not, the work is not covered by RCW 39.12. If yes, go to question 5.
5. Is the prefabricated item intended for the public works project typically an inventory item which could reasonably be sold on the general market? If not, the work is covered by RCW 39.12. If yes, go to question 6.
6. Does the specific prefabricated item, generally defined as standard, have any unusual characteristics such as shape, type of material, strength requirements, finish, etc? If yes, the work is covered under RCW 39.12.

Prefabricated items specifically produced for public works projects that are prefabricated in a county other than the county wherein the public works project is to be completed, the wage for the offsite prefabrication shall be the applicable prevailing wage for the county in which the actual prefabrication takes place.

It is the manufacturer of the prefabricated product to verify that the correct county wage rates are applied to work they perform.

See RCW 39.12.010

(The definition of "locality" in RCW 39.12.010(2) contains the phrase "wherein the physical work is being performed." The department interprets this phrase to mean the actual work site.

WSDOT's List of State Occupations not applicable to Heavy and Highway Construction Projects

This project is subject to the state hourly minimum rates for wages and fringe benefits in the contract provisions, as provided by the state Department of Labor and Industries.

The following list of occupations, is comprised of those occupations that are not normally used in the construction of heavy and highway projects.

When considering job classifications for use and / or payment when bidding on, or building heavy and highway construction projects for, or administered by WSDOT, these Occupations will be excepted from the included "Washington State Prevailing Wage Rates For Public Work Contracts" documents.

- Playground & Park Equipment Installers
- Power Equipment Operators - Underground Sewer & Water
- Residential *** ALL ASSOCIATED RATES ***
- Sign Makers and Installers (Non-Electrical)
- Sign Makers and Installers (Electrical)
- Stage Rigging Mechanics (Non Structural)

The following occupations may be used only as outlined in the preceding text concerning "WSDOT's list for Suppliers - Manufacturers - Fabricators"

- Fabricated Precast Concrete Products
- Metal Fabrication (In Shop)

Definitions for the Scope of Work for prevailing wages may be found at the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries web site and in WAC Chapter 296-127.

Washington State Department of Labor and Industries
Policy Statements
(Regarding Production and Delivery of Gravel, Concrete, Asphalt, etc.)

WAC 296-127-018 Agency filings affecting this section

Coverage and exemptions of workers involved in the production and delivery of gravel, concrete, asphalt, or similar materials.

(1) The materials covered under this section include but are not limited to: Sand, gravel, crushed rock, concrete, asphalt, or other similar materials.

(2) All workers, regardless of by whom employed, are subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they perform any or all of the following functions:

(a) They deliver or discharge any of the above-listed materials to a public works project site:

(i) At one or more point(s) directly upon the location where the material will be incorporated into the project; or

(ii) At multiple points at the project; or

(iii) Adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation of those materials.

(b) They wait at or near a public works project site to perform any tasks subject to this section of the rule.

(c) They remove any materials from a public works construction site pursuant to contract requirements or specifications (e.g., excavated materials, materials from demolished structures, clean-up materials, etc.).

(d) They work in a materials production facility (e.g., batch plant, borrow pit, rock quarry, etc.) which is established for a public works project for the specific, but not necessarily exclusive, purpose of supplying materials for the project.

(e) They deliver concrete to a public works site regardless of the method of incorporation.

(f) They assist or participate in the incorporation of any materials into the public works project.

(3) All travel time that relates to the work covered under subsection (2) of this section requires the payment of prevailing wages. Travel time includes time spent waiting to load, loading, transporting, waiting to unload, and delivering materials. Travel time would include all time spent in travel in support of a public works project whether the vehicle is empty or full. For example, travel time spent returning to a supply source to obtain another load of material for use on a public works site or returning to the public works site to obtain another load of excavated material is time spent in travel that is subject to prevailing wage. Travel to a supply source, including travel from a public works site, to obtain materials for use on a private project would not be travel subject to the prevailing wage.

(4) Workers are not subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they deliver materials to a stockpile.

(a) A "stockpile" is defined as materials delivered to a pile located away from the site of incorporation such that the stockpiled materials must be physically moved from the stockpile and transported to another location on the project site in order to be incorporated into the project.


(b) A stockpile does not include any of the functions described in subsection (2)(a) through (f) of this section; nor does a stockpile include materials delivered or distributed to multiple locations upon the project site; nor does a stockpile include materials dumped at the place of incorporation, or adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation.

(5) The applicable prevailing wage rate shall be determined by the locality in which the work is performed. Workers subject to subsection (2)(d) of this section, who produce such materials at an off-site facility shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the off-site facility is located. Workers subject to subsection (2) of this section, who deliver such materials to a public works project site shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the public works project is located.

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GRANT COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS PATH PROJECT PHASE 1




