

30 line. No materials shall be placed below the ordinary high water line without the
31 Engineer's concurrence.

33 6. When a violation of the Construction Stormwater General Permit (CSWGP) occurs,
34 immediately notify the Engineer and fill out WSDOT Form 422-011, Contractor
35 ECAP Report, and submit the form to the Engineer within 48 hours of the violation.
36
37 7. Once Physical Completion has been given, prepare a Notice of Termination
38 (Ecology Form ECY 020-87) and submit the Notice of Termination electronically to
39 the Engineer in a PDF format a minimum of 7 calendar days prior to submitting the
40 Notice of Termination to Ecology.
41
42 8. Transfer the CSWGP coverage to the Contracting Agency when Physical
43 Completion has been given and the Engineer has determined that the project site
44 is not stabilized from erosion.

46 9. Submit copies of all correspondence with Ecology electronically to the Engineer in
47 a PDF format within four calendar days.

All Work that is not performed by the Contractor will be considered as subcontracting except: (1) purchase of sand, gravel, crushed stone, crushed slag, batched concrete aggregates, ready-mix concrete, off-site fabricated structural steel, other off-site fabricated items, and any other materials supplied by established and recognized commercial plants; or (2) delivery of these materials to the Work site in vehicles owned or operated by such plants or by recognized independent or commercial hauling companies hired by those commercial plants.

The following new paragraph is inserted after the seventh paragraph:

The Contractor shall not use businesses (material suppliers, vendors, subcontractors, etc.) with federal purchasing exclusions. Businesses with exclusions are identified using the System for Award Management web page at www.SAM.gov.

1-08.5 Time for Completion

Item number 2 of the sixth paragraph is supplemented with the following:

f. A copy of the Notice of Termination sent to the Washington State Department of Ecology (Ecology); the elapse of 30 calendar days from the date of receipt of the Notice of Termination by Ecology; and no rejection of the Notice of Termination by Ecology. This requirement will not apply if the Construction Stormwater General Permit is transferred back to the Contracting Agency in accordance with Section 8-01.3(16).

1-08.7 Maintenance During Suspension

7 treatments existing at the time of the excavation shall be included in the height calculation.
8

9 **Submittals and Design Requirements**

10 Excavations 4-feet and less in height do not require design and submittals. The Contractor
11 shall provide a safe work environment and shall execute the work in a manner that does not
12 damage adjacent pavements, utilities, or structures. If the Engineer determines the
13 Contractor's work may potentially affect adjacent traffic, pavements, utilities, or structures,
14 the Engineer may request a Type 1 Working Drawing from the Contractor. The Contractor

31 those shall be shown in cross section.

- 33 3. A summary clearly describing subsurface conditions, soil type for WAC 296-155 part
34 N, and groundwater conditions, sequencing considerations, and governing
35 assumptions.

37 Where WAC 296-155 part N requires an engineer's design, the Contractor shall submit Type
38 2E Working Drawings. Required submittal elements include, at a minimum, the three items
39 above and the following additional items:

41 4. Supporting calculations for the design of the excavation, the soil and material
42 properties selected for design, and the justification for the selection for those
43 properties, in accordance with the WSDOT *Geotechnical Design Manual* M 46-03.
44
- 45 5. Safety factors, or load and resistance factors used, and justification for their
46 selection, in accordance with the WSDOT *Geotechnical Design Manual* M 46-03,
47 and referenced AASHTO design manuals.
48
- 49 6. A monitoring plan to evaluate the excavation performance throughout its design life.
50
- 51 7. Any supplemental subsurface explorations made by the Contractor to meet the
52 requirements for geotechnical design of excavation slopes, in accordance with the
53 WSDOT *Geotechnical Design Manual* M 46-03.

41 **5-01.3(4) Replace Cement Concrete Panel**

42 This section’s content is deleted and replaced with the following new subsections:
43

44 **5-01.3(4)A General**

45 Curing, cold weather work, concrete pavement construction in adjacent lines, and protection
46 of pavement shall meet the requirements of Section 5-05.3(13) through Section 5-05.3(15).

1 The Contractor, at no cost to the Contracting Agency, shall repair any damage to existing
2 pavement caused by the Contractor's operations.
3

4 **5-01.3(4)B Sawing and Dimensional Requirements**

5 Concrete slabs to be replaced as shown in the Plans or staked by the Engineer shall be at
6 least 6.0 feet long and full width of an existing pavement panel. The portion of the panel to
7 remain in place shall have a minimum dimension of 6 feet in length and full panel width;
8 otherwise the entire panel shall be removed and replaced. There shall be no new joints closer
9 than 3.0 feet to an existing transverse joint or crack. A vertical full depth saw cut is required
10 along all longitudinal joints and at transverse locations and, unless the Engineer allows
11 otherwise, an additional vertical full depth relief saw cut located 12 to 18 inches from and
12 parallel to the initial longitudinal and transverse saw cut locations is also required. Removal
13 of existing cement concrete pavement shall not cause damage to adjacent slabs that are to
14 remain in place. In areas that will be ground, slab replacements shall be performed prior to
15 pavement grinding.
16

17 Side forms shall meet the requirements of Section 5-05.3(7)B whenever a sawed full depth
18 vertical face cannot be maintained.

20 **5-01.3(4)C Dowel Bars and Tie Bars**

35 adjusted dowel bars meet the tolerances below.

39 table below. The horizontal position of tie bars may be adjusted to avoid contact with existing
40 tie bars in the longitudinal joint where panel replacement takes place, provided the adjusted

9 A cleated roller, crawler tractor, or similar equipment, which forms longitudinal depressions
10 at least 2 inches deep shall be used for compaction and preparation of the surface to be
11 seeded. The entire area shall be uniformly covered with longitudinal depressions formed
12 perpendicular to the natural flow of water on the slope. The soil shall be conditioned with
13 sufficient water so the longitudinal depressions remain in the soil surface until completion of
14 the seeding.

15
16 **8-01.3(2)A1 Seeding**

17 This section is deleted in its entirety.

18
19 **8-01.3(2)A2 Temporary Seeding**

20 This section is deleted in its entirety.

21
22 **8-01.3(2)B Seeding and Fertilizing**

23 This section, including title, is revised to read:

24
25 **8-01.3(2)B Temporary Seeding**

26 Temporary grass seed shall be a commercially prepared mix, made up of low growing grass
27 species that will grow without irrigation at the project location, and accepted by the Engineer.
28 The application rate shall be two pounds per 1000 square feet.

29
30 The Contractor shall notify the Engineer not less than 24 hours in advance of any seeding
31 operation and shall not begin the Work until areas prepared or designated for seeding have
32 been accepted. Following the Engineer's acceptance, seeding of the accepted slopes shall
33 begin immediately.

34
35 Temporary seeding may be sown at any time allowed by the Engineer. Temporary seeding
36 shall be sown by one of the following methods:

- 37
38 1. A hydro seeder that utilizes water as the carrying agent, and maintains continuous
39 agitation through paddle blades. It shall have an operating capacity sufficient to
40 agitate, suspend, and mix into a homogeneous slurry the specified amount of seed
41 and water or other material. Distribution and discharge lines shall be large enough
42 to prevent stoppage and shall be equipped with a set of hydraulic discharge spray
43 nozzles that will provide a uniform distribution of the slurry.
44
45 2. Blower equipment with an adjustable disseminating device capable of maintaining
46 a constant, measured rate of material discharge that will ensure an even distribution
47 of seed at the rates specified.
48
49 3. Power-drawn drills or seeders.
50
51 4. Areas in which the above methods are impractical may be seeded by hand
52 methods.
53

1 When seeding by hand, the seed shall be incorporated into the top ¼ inch of soil by hand
2 raking or other method that is allowed by the Engineer.

3
4 Seed applied using a hydroseeder shall have a tracer added to visibly aid uniform application.
5 This tracer shall not be harmful to plant, aquatic, or animal life. If Short-Term Mulch is used
6 as a tracer, the application rate shall not exceed 250 pounds per acre.

7
8 Seed and fertilizer may be applied in one application provided that the fertilizer is placed in
9 the hydroseeder tank no more than 1 hour prior to application.

15 Temporary mulch shall be straw, wood strand, or HECF mulch and shall be used for the
16 purpose of erosion control by protecting bare soil surface from particle displacement. Mulch
17 shall not be applied below the anticipated water level of ditch slopes, pond bottoms, and
18 stream banks. HECF mulch shall not be used within the Ordinary High Water Mark. Non-
19 HECF mulches applied below the anticipated water level shall be removed or anchored down
20 so that it cannot move or float, at no additional expense to the Contracting Agency.

21
22 Straw or wood strand mulch shall be applied at a rate to achieve at least 95 percent visual
23 blockage of the soil surface.

24
25 Short Term Mulch shall be hydraulically applied at the rate of 2500 pounds per acre and may
26 be applied in one lift.

27
28 Moderate Term Mulch and Long Term Mulch shall be hydraulically applied at the rate of 3500
29 pounds per acre with no more than 2000 pounds applied in any single lift.

30
31 Mulch sprayed on signs or sign Structures shall be removed the same day.

32
33 Areas not accessible by mulching equipment shall be mulched by accepted hand methods.

34 35 **8-01.3(2)F Dates for Application of Final Seed, Fertilizer, and Mulch**

39 This section is deleted in its entirety.

40 41 **8-01.3(2)H Inspection**

42 This section is deleted in its entirety.

43 44 **8-01.3(2)I Mowing**

45 This section is deleted in its entirety.

46 47 **8-01.3(3) Placing Biodegradable Erosion Control Blanket**

48 This section's title is revised to read:

49 50 **8-01.3(3) Placing Erosion Control Blanket**

51
52 The first sentence of the first paragraph is revised to read:

1 Erosion Control Blankets are used as an erosion prevention device and to enhance the
2 establishment of vegetation.

3
4 The second paragraph is revised to read:

5
6 When used to enhance the establishment of seeded areas, seeding and fertilizing shall be
7 done prior to blanket installation.
8

9 **8-01.3(4) Placing Compost Blanket**

10 This section is revised to read:

11
12 Compost blankets are used for erosion control. Compost blanket shall be only be placed on
13 ground surfaces that are steeper than 3-foot horizontal and 1-foot vertical though steeper
14 slopes shall be broken by wattles or compost socks placed according to the Standard Plans.
15 Compost shall be placed to a depth of 3 inches over bare soil. An organic tackifier shall be
16 placed over the entire composted area when dry or windy conditions are present or expected.
17 The tackifier shall be applied immediately after the application of compost to prevent compost
18 from leaving the composted area.
19

20 Medium compost shall be used for the compost blanket. Compost may serve the purpose of
21 soil amendment as specified in Section 8-02.3(6).
22

23 **8-01.3(5) Plastic Covering**

24 The first paragraph is revised to read:

25
26 **Erosion Control** – Plastic coverings used to temporarily cover stockpiled materials, slopes
27 or bare soils shall be installed and maintained in a way that prevents water from intruding
28 under the plastic and prevents the plastic cover from being damaged by wind. Plastic
29 coverings shall be placed with at least a 12-inch overlap of all seams and be a minimum of 6
30 mils thick. Use soil stabilization and energy dissipation BMPs to minimize the erosive energy
31 flows coming off sloped areas of plastic (e.g., toe of slope). When feasible, prevent the clean
32 runoff from plastic from hitting bare soil. Direct flows from plastic to stabilized outlet areas.
33

34 **8-01.3(7) Stabilized Construction Entrance**

35 The first paragraph is revised to read:

36
37 Temporary stabilized construction entrance shall be constructed in accordance with the
38 *Standard Plans*, prior to construction vehicles entering the roadway from locations that
39 generate sediment track out on the roadway. Material used for stabilized construction
40 entrance shall be free of extraneous materials that may cause or contribute to track out.
41

42 **8-01.3(8) Street Cleaning**

43 This section is revised to read:

44
45 Self-propelled pickup street sweepers shall be used to remove and collect dirt and other
46 debris from the Roadway. The street sweeper shall effectively collect these materials and
47 prevent them from being washed or blown off the Roadway or into waters of the State. Street
48 sweepers shall not generate fugitive dust and shall be designed and operated in compliance
49 with applicable air quality standards. Material collected by the street sweeper shall be
50 disposed of in accordance with Section 2-03.3(7)C.

52 When allowed by the Engineer, power broom sweepers may be used in non-sensitive areas.
53 The broom sweeper shall sweep dirt and other debris from the roadway into the work area.
54 The swept material shall be prevented from entering or washing into waters of the State.

1
2 Street washing with water will require the concurrence of the Engineer.
3

4 **8-01.3(12) Compost Socks**

5 The first two sentences of the first paragraph are revised to read:
6

7 Compost socks are used to disperse flow and sediment. Compost socks shall be installed as
8 soon as construction will allow but before flow conditions create erosive flows or discharges
9 from the site. Compost socks shall be installed prior to any mulching or compost placement.
10

11 **8-01.3(13) Temporary Curb**

12 The last two sentences of the second paragraph are revised to read:
13

14 Temporary curbs shall be a minimum of 4 inches in height. Temporary curb shall be installed
15 so that ponding does not occur in the adjacent roadway.

20 The pipe fittings shall be water tight and the pipe secured to the slope with metal posts, wood
21 stakes, or sand bags.

24 rock splash pad, or vegetated strip, in a manner to prevent erosion and maintain water quality
25 compliance.
26

27 The last paragraph is deleted.
28

29 **8-01.3(15) Maintenance**

30 This section is revised to read:
31

32 Erosion and sediment control BMPs shall be maintained or adaptively managed as required
33 by the CSWGP until the Engineer determines they are no longer needed. When deficiencies
34 in functional performance are identified, the deficiencies shall be rectified immediately.
35

36 The BMPs shall be inspected on the schedule outlined in Section 8-01.3(1)B for damage and
37 sediment deposits. Damage to or undercutting of BMPs shall be repaired immediately.
38

39 In areas where the Contractor's activities have compromised the erosion control functions of
40 the existing grasses, the Contractor shall oversee at no additional cost to the Contracting
41 Agency.
42

43 The quarry spalls of construction entrances shall be refreshed, replaced, or screened to
44 maintain voids between the spalls for collecting mud and dirt.
45

46 Unless otherwise specified, when the depth of accumulated sediment and debris reaches
47 approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ the height of the BMP the deposits shall be removed. Debris or
48 contaminated sediment shall be disposed of in accordance with Section 2-03.3(7)C. Clean
49 sediments may be stabilized on-site using BMPs as allowed by the Engineer.
50

51 **8-01.3(16) Removal**

52 This section is revised to read:
53

1 The Contractor shall remove all temporary BMPs, all associated hardware and associated
2 accumulated sediment deposition from the project limits prior to Physical Completion unless
3 otherwise allowed by the Engineer. When the temporary BMP materials are made of natural
4 plant fibers unaltered by synthetic materials the Engineer may allow leaving the BMP in place.
5

6 The Contractor shall remove BMPs and associated hardware in a way that minimizes soil
7 disturbance. The Contractor shall permanently stabilize all bare and disturbed soil after
8 removal of BMPs. If the installation and use of the erosion control BMPs have compacted or
9 otherwise rendered the soil inhospitable to plant growth, such as construction entrances, the
10 Contractor shall take measures to rehabilitate the soil to facilitate plant growth. This may
11 include, but is not limited to, ripping the soil, incorporating soil amendments, or seeding with
12 the specified seed.
13

14 At the request of the Contractor and at the sole discretion of the Engineer the CSWGP may
15 be transferred back to the Contracting Agency. Approval of the Transfer of Coverage request
16 will require the following:
17

- 18 1. All other Work required for Contract Completion has been completed.
- 19
- 20 2. All Work required for compliance with the CSWGP has been completed to the
21 maximum extent possible. This includes removal of BMPs that are no longer
22 needed and the site has undergone all Stabilization identified for meeting the
23 requirements of Final Stabilization in the CSWGP.
- 24
- 25 3. An Equitable Adjustment change order for the cost of Work that has not been
26 completed by the Contractor.
- 27
- 28 4. Submittal of the Washington State Department of Ecology Transfer of Coverage
29 form (Ecology form ECY 020-87a) to the Engineer.
30

31 If the Engineer approves the transfer of coverage back to the Contracting Agency, the
32 requirement in Section 1-07.5(3) for the Contractor's submittal of the Notice of Termination
33 form to the Washington State Department of Ecology will not apply.
34

35 **8-01.4 Measurement**

36 This section's content is deleted and replaced with the following new subsections:
37

38 **8-01.4(1) Lump Sum Bid for Project (No Unit Items)**

39 When the Bid Proposal contains the item "Erosion Control and Water Pollution Prevention"
40 there will be no measurement of unit or force account items for Work defined in Section 8-01
41 except as described in Sections 8-01.4(3) and 8-01.4(4). Also, except as described in Section
42 8-01.4(3), all of Sections 8-01.4(2) and 8-01.5(2) are deleted.
43

44 **8-01.4(2) Item Bids**

45 When the Proposal does not contain the items "Erosion Control and Water Pollution
46 Prevention", Section 8-01.4(1) and 8-01.5(1) are deleted and the Bid Proposal will contain
47 some or all of the following items measured as noted.
48

49 ESC lead will be measured per day for each day that an inspection is made and a report
50 is filed.

51
52 Erosion control blanket and plastic covering will be measured by the square yard along
53 the ground slope line of surface area covered and accepted.
54

1 Turbidity curtains will be measured by the linear foot along the ground line of the installed
2 curtain.

3
4 Check dams will be measured per linear foot one time only along the ground line of the
5 completed check dam. No additional measurement will be made for check dams that are
6 required to be rehabilitated or replaced due to wear.

7
8 Stabilized construction entrances will be measured by the square yard by ground slope
9 measurement for each entrance constructed.

10
11 Tire wash facilities will be measured per each for each tire wash installed.

12
13 Street cleaning will be measured by the hour for the actual time spent cleaning
14 pavement, refilling with water, dumping and transport to and from cleaning locations
15 within the project limits, as authorized by the Engineer. Time to mobilize the equipment
16 to or from the project limits on which street cleaning is required will not be measured.

17
18 Inlet protections will be measured per each for each initial installation at a
19 drainage structure.

20
21 Silt fence, gravel filter, compost berms, and wood chip berms will be measured by
22 the linear foot along the ground line of the completed barrier.

23
24 Wattles and compost socks will be measured by the linear foot.

25
26 Temporary curbs will be measured by the linear foot along the ground line of the
27 completed installation.

28
29 Temporary pipe slope drains will be measured by the linear foot along the flow line of
30 the pipe.

31
32 Coir logs will be measured by the linear foot along the ground line of the completed
33 installation.

34
35 Outlet protections will be measured per each initial installation at an outlet location.

36
37 Temporary seeding, temporary mulching, and tackifiers will be measured by the acre by
38 ground slope measurement.

39
40 Compost blanket will be measured by the square yard by ground slope surface area
41 covered and accepted.

42
43 **8-01.4(3) Reinstating Unit Items with Lump Sum Erosion Control and Water**
44 **Pollution Prevention**

45 The Contract Provisions may establish the project as lump sum, in accordance with Section
46 8-01.4(1) and also include one or more of the items included above in Section 8-01.4(2).
47 When that occurs, the corresponding measurement provision in Section 8-01.4(2) is not
48 deleted and the Work under that item will be measured as specified.

49
50 **8-01.4(4) Items not included with Lump Sum Erosion Control and Water**
51 **Pollution Prevention**

52 Compost blanket will be measured by the square yard by ground slope surface area covered
53 and accepted.

1 Temporary mulch will be measured by the acre by ground slope surface area covered and
2 accepted.

3
4 High visibility fence will be measured by the linear foot along the ground line of the completed
5 fence.
6

7 **8-01.5 Payment**

8 This section's content is deleted and replaced with the following new subsections:
9

3 **April 1, 2019**

4 This section, including all subsections, is revised to read:

5

6 **8-02.1 Description**

7 This Work consists of preserving, maintaining, establishing and augmenting vegetation on
8 the roadsides and within mitigation or sundry site areas. It includes vegetation preservation,
9 weed and pest control, furnishing and placing topsoil, compost, and soil amendments, and
10 furnishing and planting seed, sod and plants of all forms and container types. It includes
11 performing plant establishment activities and soil bioengineering. Work shall be performed in
12 accordance with these Specifications and as shown in the Plans or as designated by
13 the Engineer.

14

15 Trees, whips, shrubs, ground covers, cuttings, live stakes, live poles, live branches,
16 rhizomes, tubers, rootstock, and seedlings will hereinafter be referred to collectively as
17 "plants" or "plant material". Grass, wildflowers, and other plant materials installed in seed
18 form will hereinafter be referred to collectively as "seed".

19

20 **8-02.2 Materials**

21 Materials shall meet the requirements of the following sections:

22

23 Erosion Control and Roadside Planting 9-14
24 Water 9-25.2

25

26 Botanical identification and nomenclature of plant materials shall be based on descriptions
27 by Hitchcock and Cronquist in "Flora of the Pacific Northwest". Botanical identification and
28 nomenclature of plant material not found in "Flora" shall be based on Bailey in "Hortus Third"
29 or superseding editions and amendments or as referenced in the Plans.

30

31 **8-02.3 Construction Requirements**

32 **8-02.3(1) Responsibility During Construction**

33 The Contractor shall prepare, install, and ensure adequate and proper care of all
34 roadside seeded, planted, and lawn areas on the project until all plant establishment
35 periods required by the Contract are complete or until Physical Completion of the project,
36 whichever is last.

37

38 Adequate and proper care shall include, but is not limited to, keeping all plant material
39 in a healthy, growing condition by watering, pruning, and other actions deemed
40 necessary for plant health. This Work shall include keeping the project area free from
41 insect infestation, weeds or unwanted vegetation, litter, and other debris along with
42 retaining the finished grades and mulch in a neat uniform condition.

43

44 Existing desirable vegetation shall be saved and protected unless removal is required
45 by the Contract or allowed by the Engineer.

46

47 The Contractor shall have sole responsibility for the maintenance and appearance of the
48 roadside restoration.

49

50 **8-02.3(2) Work Plans**

51 Three Work Plan submittals exist under this Section:

52

- 1 1. Roadside Work Plan: This plan is required when Work will disturb the roadside
2 beyond 20 feet from the pavement or where trees or native vegetation will be
3 removed, the Contractor shall submit a Type 2 Working Drawing.
- 4
- 5 2. Weed and Pest Control Plan: This plan is required when the proposal contains
6 the item "Weed and Pest Control," and prior to application of any chemicals or
7 weed control activities, the Contractor shall submit a Type 2 Working Drawing.
- 8
- 9 3. Plant Establishment Plan: This plan is required when the proposal contains the
10 item "PSIPE__", and prior to completion of Initial Planting, the Contractor shall
11 submit a Type 2 Working Drawing.
- 12

13 **8-02.3(2)A Roadside Work Plan**

14 The Roadside Work Plan shall define the expected impacts to the roadside and
15 restoration resulting from Work necessary to meet all Contract requirements. The
16 Contractor shall define how the roadside restoration Work included in the Contract
17 will be phased and coordinated with project Work such as earthwork, staging,
18 access, erosion and water pollution control, irrigation, etc. The Roadside Work Plan
19 shall include the following:

- 21 1. Limiting impacts to roadsides:
 - 22 a. Limits of Work including locations of staging or parking.
 - 23 b. Means and methods for vegetation protection (in accordance with
24 Section 1-07.16(2)).

26 to provide access routes or other needs to accomplish the Work.

 - 28 d. Plans for removal, preservation and stockpile of topsoil or other native
29 materials, if outside of clearing and grubbing limits and within the

- 32 2. Roadside Restoration:
 - 33 a. Plan for propagation and procurement of plants, ground preparation
34 for planting, and installation of plants.
 - 35 b. Means and methods to limit soil compaction where seeding and
36 planting are to occur, such as steel plates, hog fuel access roads,
37 wood mats for sensitive areas (including removal) and decompaction
38 for unavoidable impacts.
 - 39
 - 40 c. Plan and timing to incorporate or remove erosion control items.
- 41
- 42 3. Lawn Installation:
 - 43 a. Schedule for lawn installation work.
 - 44
 - 45 b. Establishment and maintenance of lawns.

 - 48

 - 50
 - 51
 - 52

1 **8-02.3(2)B Weed and Pest Control Plan**

2 The Weed and Pest Control Plan shall describe all weed and pest control needs for
3 the project.

4
5 The plan shall be prepared and signed by a licensed Commercial Pest Control
6 Operator or Consultant. The plan for control of weeds and pests on the Contract in
7 accordance with Section 8-02.3(3) shall include the following:

- 8
9
- 10 1. Names of plan preparer and pesticide operators, including contact
11 information. The Contractor shall furnish the Engineer evidence that all
12 operators are licensed with appropriate endorsements, and that the
13 pesticide used is registered for use by the Washington State Department
14 of Agriculture.
 - 15 2. Means and methods of weed control, including mechanical and/or
16 chemical.
 - 17 3. Schedule for weed control including re-entry times for pesticide application
18 by pesticide type.
 - 19 4. Proposed pesticide use in accordance with Section 8-02.3(3)A: name,
20 application rate, and Safety Data Sheets of all proposed pesticides.
21 Include a copy of the current product label for each pesticide to be used.
 - 22 5. Plan to ensure worker safety until pesticide re-entry periods are met.
- 23

25
26

27 **8-02.3(2)C Plant Establishment Plan**

28 The Plant Establishment Plan shall describe activities necessary to ensure
29 continued health and vigor of planted and seeded areas in accordance with the
30 requirements of Sections 8-02.3(12) and 8-02.3(13). Should the plan become
31 unworkable at any time during the first-year plant establishment, the Contractor
32 shall submit a revised plan prior to proceeding with further Work. The Plant
33 Establishment Plan shall include:

- 34
- 35 1. Proposed scheduling of joint inspection meetings, activities, materials,
36 equipment to be utilized for the first-year plant establishment.
 - 37 2. Proposed adaptive management activities to ensure successful
38 establishment of seeded, sodded, and planted areas.
 - 39 3. A contact person.
 - 40 4. Management of the irrigation system, when applicable.

42
43
44

45 **8-02.3(3) Weed and Pest Control**

46 The Contractor shall control weed and pest species within the project limits using
47 integrated pest management principles consisting of mechanical, biological, and
48 chemical controls that are outlined in the Weed and Pest Control Plan or as designated
49 by the Engineer. Controlling weeds consists of killing and removing weeds by chemical,
50 mechanical, and hand methods.

51
52 **8-02.3(3)A Chemical Pesticides**

53 Chemical pesticides include, but are not restricted to, any substance or mixture of
54 substances intended for preventing, destroying, repelling or mitigating any pest,

1 including but not limited to, insecticides, herbicides, fungicides, adjuvants, and
2 additives, including plant regulators, defoliants and desiccants. The Contractor
3 shall apply chemical pesticides in accordance with the label recommendations, the
4 Washington State Department of Ecology, local sensitive area ordinances, and
5 Washington State Department of Agriculture laws and regulations. Only those
6 pesticides listed in the table Herbicides Approved for Use on WSDOT Rights of Way
7 and accepted as part of the Weed and Pest Control Plan or by written authorization
8 from the Engineer may be used
9 (www.wsdot.wa.gov/maintenance/roadside/herbicide_use.htm).

10
11 The applicator shall be licensed by the State of Washington as a Commercial
12 Applicator or Commercial Operator, with additional endorsements as required by
13 the Special Provisions or the proposed weed control plan. All chemical pesticides
14 shall be delivered to the job site in the original containers, or if pre-mixed off-site, a
15 certification of the components and formulation from the supplier is required. The
16 licensed applicator or operator shall complete WSDOT Form 540-509, Commercial
17 Pesticide Application Record, each day the pesticide is applied and furnish a copy
18 to the Engineer by the following business day.

19
20 The Contractor shall ensure confinement of the chemicals within the designated
21 areas. The use of spray chemical pesticides shall require the use of anti-drift and
22 activating agents and a spray pattern indicator unless otherwise allowed by the
23 Engineer.

24
25 The Contractor shall assume all responsibility for rendering any area unsatisfactory
26 for planting by reason of chemical application. Damage to adjacent areas, either on
27 or off the Highway Right of Way, shall be repaired to the satisfaction of the Engineer
28 or the property owner at no additional cost to the Contracting Agency.

29
30 **8-02.3(3)B Planting and Lawn Area Weed Control**

31 Planting and lawn area weed control consists of controlling weeds and pests in
32 planted and lawn areas shown in the Plans. This Work is included in the bid items
33 for planting and lawn installation.

34
35 All planting and lawn areas shall be prepared so that they are weed and debris free
36 at the time of planting and until completion of the project. The planting areas shall
37 include the entire ground surface, regardless of cover, areas around plants, and
38 those areas shown in the Plans.

39
40 Within planting or lawn areas, all species that are not shown in the Plans are
41 unwanted and shall be controlled unless specifically allowed by the Engineer to
42 remain.

43
44 Grass growing within the mulch ring of a plant, including grass applied in
45 accordance with Sections 8-01.3(2)A1, 8-02.3(9) or 8-02.3(10), shall be considered
46 a weed and shall be controlled on the project in accordance with the weed and pest
47 control plan.

48
49 All applications of post-emergent herbicides shall be made while green and growing
50 tissue is present. Residual herbicides shall not be used where rhizomatous species
51 or perennial species are indicated.

52
53 Should unwanted vegetation reach the flowering and seed stage in violation of
54 these Specifications, the Contractor shall physically remove and bag the seed

1 heads prior to seed dispersion. All physically removed vegetation and seed heads
2 shall be disposed of off-site at no cost to the Contracting Agency.

3
4 **8-02.3(3)C Project Area Weed and Pest Control**

5 The Contractor shall control weeds not otherwise covered in accordance with
6 Section 8-02.3(3)B, in all areas within the project limits, including erosion control
7 seeding areas and vegetation preservation areas, as designated by the Engineer.
8

9 When the Bid Item "Project Area Weed and Pest Control" is included in the Contract,
10 the Contractor shall also control all weeds specified as noxious by the Washington
11 State Department of Agriculture, the local Weed District, or the County Noxious
12 Weed Control Board outside of planting areas within the project limits.
13

14 **8-02.3(4) Topsoil**

15 Topsoil shall not be worked or placed when the ground or topsoil is frozen, or excessively
16 wet.
17

18 The Contractor shall protect topsoil stockpiled for project use to prevent erosion and
19 weed growth. Weed growth on topsoil stockpile sites shall be immediately eliminated in
20 accordance with the accepted Weed and Pest Control Plan and Section 8-02.3(3)C.
21

22 The subsoil where topsoil is to be placed shall be tilled to a depth of 1 foot or as specified
23 in the Special Provisions or the Plans. Topsoil of the type specified shall be evenly
24 spread over the specified areas to the depth shown in the Plans or as otherwise ordered
25 by the Engineer. Topsoil depths greater than 6 inches shall be placed in lifts no more
26 than 6 inches in depth. The first lift of topsoil shall be incorporated with sub-soil to a
27 depth of 8 inches and subsequent lifts placed and lightly tamped between lifts. After the
28 topsoil has been spread, all large clods, hard lumps, and rocks 2 inches in diameter and
29 larger, and litter shall be raked up, removed, and disposed.
30

31 **8-02.3(4)A Topsoil Type A**

32 Topsoil Type A shall be as specified in the Special Provisions. The Contractor shall
33 submit a certification by the supplier that the contents of the Topsoil meet the
34 requirements in the Special Provisions.
35

36 **8-02.3(4)B Topsoil Type B**

37 Topsoil Type B shall be naturally occurring topsoil taken from within the project limits
38 and shall meet the requirements of Section 9-14.1(2). Topsoil Type B shall be taken
39 from areas shown in the Plans to the designated depth and stockpiled at locations
40 that will not interfere with the construction of the project, and outside of sensitive
41 areas, as allowed by the Engineer. A minimum of two weeks prior to excavation of
42 Topsoil Type B, the Contractor shall pre-treat the vegetation on the designated
43 Topsoil Type B areas according to the Weed and Pest Control Plan. Areas beyond
44 the slope stakes shall be disturbed as little as possible in the above operations and
45 under no circumstances shall Topsoil Type B be stockpiled within 10 feet of any
46 existing tree or vegetation area designated to be saved and protected. The
47 Contractor shall protect topsoil stockpile from weed infestation.
48

49 The Contractor shall set aside sufficient material to satisfy the needs of the project.
50

51 Upon completion of topsoil placement, the Contractor shall dispose of remaining
52 stockpiled Topsoil Type B not required for use on the project at no additional
53 expense to the Contracting Agency in accordance with Section 2-03.3(7)C.
54

1 Should a shortage of Topsoil Type B occur, and the Contractor has wasted or
2 otherwise disposed of topsoil material, the Contractor shall furnish Topsoil Type A
3 or C at no additional expense to the Contracting Agency.
4

5 **8-02.3(4)C Topsoil Type C**

6 Topsoil Type C shall be naturally occurring topsoil obtained from a source provided
7 by the Contractor outside of the Contracting Agency-owned Right of Way. Topsoil
8 Type C shall meet the requirements of Sections 8-02.3(4)B and 9-14.1(3). The
9 Contractor shall not begin removal of Topsoil Type C from the proposed source until
10 the material has been allowed for use by the Engineer.
11

12 **8-02.3(5) Roadside Seeding, Lawn and Planting Area Preparation**

13 This Work includes preparing worked areas for the installation of all types of permanent
14 erosion control planting. Work shall be conducted so the flow lines in drainage channels
15 are maintained. Material displaced by the Contractor's operations that interferes with
16 drainage shall be removed from the channel and disposed of as allowed by the Engineer.
17

18 **8-02.3(5)A Seeding Area Preparation**

19 The Contractor shall prepare roadside seeding areas as follows:
20

- 21 1. Remove all excess material, debris, stumps, and rocks greater than 3
22 inches in diameter from areas to be seeded. Dispose of removed materials
23 offsite.
- 24 2. Prepare roadside seeding area to a weed free and bare condition.
- 25 3. Bring area to uniform grade and install topsoil, soil amendments, or
26 compost as specified. Any slopes 3(H) to 1(V) or steeper shall not be tilled
27 unless otherwise specified.
- 28 4. Compact to provide a reasonably firm but friable seedbed; tractor walk to
29 uniformly cover the surface with longitudinal depressions at least 2 inches
30 deep formed perpendicular to the natural flow of water on the slope.
31 Condition the soil with sufficient water so the longitudinal depressions
32 remain in the soil surface until completion of the seeding.
- 33 5. Seed and mulch within 2 days of preparation.
34
35
36
37
38

39 **8-02.3(5)B Lawn Area Preparation**

40 The Contractor shall prepare lawn areas as follows:
41

- 42 1. Prepare lawn area to a weed free and bare condition in accordance with
43 Section 8-02.3(3)B.
- 44 2. Remove excess material, stumps, wood or rocks over 3 inches in diameter
45 and remove from site.
- 46 3. Bring area to uniform grade and install topsoil or soil amendments in
47 accordance with Section 8-02.3(4) and 8-02.3(6).
- 48 4. Till to an 8-inch depth, rake to a smooth even grade without low areas that
49 trap water, and compact with a 50-pound roller. The finished grade of the
50 soil shall be 1 inch below the top of all curbs, junction and valve boxes,
51 walks, driveways, and other Structures.
52
53
54

- 1
2 5. Seed or sod the area within two days of preparation.
3

4 **8-02.3(5)C Planting Area Preparation**

5 The Contractor shall prepare planting areas as follows:
6

- 7 1. Prepare planting area to a weed free and bare condition in accordance
8 with Section 8-02.3(3)B.
9
10 2. Decompact soil to a depth of 18 inches where construction activities have
11 taken place or where native soils are compacted.
12
13 3. Return soil to uniform grade even with surrounding areas, leaving no holes
14 or mounds over 3 inches in depth or height.
15
16 4. Remove excess material, stumps, wood or rocks over 3 inches in diameter
17 and remove from site.
18
19 5. Apply compost or other amendments as indicated in the plans and in
20 accordance with Section 8-02.3(6).
21
22 6. Cultivate amendments to a depth of 12 inches to provide a reasonably firm
23 but friable planting area. Do not till any slopes 3(H) to 1(V) or steeper.
24
25 7. Return soil to a uniform finished grade, 1 inch, or the specified depth of
26 mulch plus 1 inch, below walks, curbs, junction and valve boxes, catch
27 basins, and driveways, unless otherwise specified.
28
29 8. Begin planting and mulching the area within two days of final preparation.
30

31 **8-02.3(6) Soil Amendments**

32 The Contractor shall place soil amendments of the type, quality, and quantities specified
33 where shown in the Plans or as specified in the Special Provisions. Areas receiving soil
34 amendments shall be bare soil or vegetation free prior to application. All soil
35 amendments shall be installed as shown in the Plans within 30 calendar days after
36 delivery to the project site.
37

38 **8-02.3(6)A Compost**

39 Compost used for soil amendments shall be Fine Compost unless otherwise
40 designated in the Plans. When compost blanket is used for temporary erosion
41 control, the compost blanket may be incorporated into the soil immediately prior to
42 planting when used as compost soil amendment. The area shall be prepared in
43 accordance with Section 8-02.3(5) prior to placing compost.
44

45 **8-02.3(6)B Fertilizers**

46 The Contractor shall apply fertilizer in the form, mixture, and rate specified in the
47 Special Provisions or as directed by the Engineer. Application procedures shall be
48 in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations unless otherwise
49 specified in the Special Provisions.
50

51 The Contractor shall submit a guaranteed fertilizer analysis label for the selected
52 product a minimum of one week prior to application for acceptance. Following the
53 Engineer's acceptance, fertilizing of the accepted ground or vegetated surfaces
54 shall begin immediately.

1
2 In seeding and lawn areas to be fertilized, the fertilizer shall be applied concurrently
3 with the seed. When fertilizer is hydraulically applied, the fertilizer shall be suitable
4 for application with seeding as specified in Section 8-02.3(9)C. If hydroseeding, the
5 fertilizer shall be placed in the hydroseeder tank no more than 1 hour prior to
6 application.
7

8 Fertilizers for planting areas shall be applied concurrently with compost and applied
9 prior to incorporation, unless tablet form fertilizer is specified. Where tablet form
10 fertilizer is specified, fertilizer shall be applied concurrently with plant installation.
11

12 Fertilizer sprayed on signs or sign structures shall be removed the same day.
13

14 Areas not accessible by fertilizing equipment shall be fertilized by allowed
15 hand methods.
16

17 Second Application: A second application of fertilizer shall be applied as specified
18 in the Special Provisions at the locations designated in the Plans. The fertilizer shall
19 be applied during the months of March, April, or May of the following year after the
20 initial seeding, planting, or lawn installation. The fertilizer shall be dry granular
21 pellets or pearls and applied in accordance with the manufacturer's
22 recommendations or as specified in the Special Provisions.
23

24 **8-02.3(7) Layout of Planting, Lawn and Seeding Areas**

25 The Contractor shall lay out and prepare planting and lawn areas and receive the
26 Engineer's acceptance of layout and preparation prior to any installation activities. The
27 Contractor shall stake the location of all trees larger than 1-inch caliper and the perimeter
28 of all planting areas for acceptance by the Engineer prior to any installation activities.
29

30 The Contractor shall locate all trees to be planted in mowable grass areas a minimum
31 of 10 feet from the edge of planting areas, other trees, fence lines, and bottom of ditches
32 unless otherwise specified.
33

34 Tree locations shown in the Plans shall be considered approximate unless shown with
35 stationing and offset distance. In irrigated areas, trees shall be located so their trunk is
36 a minimum of $\frac{1}{3}$ of the spray radius away from the nearest sprinkler head.
37

38 Unless otherwise shown, planting areas located adjacent to Roadways shall begin 6 feet
39 from the edge of shoulder on roadway fills and begin 5 feet up on the back slope from
40 the bottom on roadway cut sections. Plants within planting areas shall be located such
41 that mature branching pattern will not block sight distance, signs, or other traffic-related
42 devices. No trees shall be placed where the mature canopy will grow to within 10 feet of
43 existing power lines. Where roadside ditches are present, planting areas shall begin 5
44 feet from the centerline of the ditch unless shown otherwise in the Plans.
45

46 **8-02.3(8) Planting**

47 **8-02.3(8)A Dates and Conditions for Planting**

48 No plant material shall be planted until it has been inspected and accepted for
49 planting by the Engineer. Rejected material shall be removed from the project site
50 immediately. All plants for the project or a sufficient quantity to plant 1-acre of the
51 site, whichever is less, shall be received on site prior to the Engineer beginning
52 inspection of the plants.
53

1 Under no circumstances will planting be permitted during unsuitable soil or weather
2 conditions as determined by the Engineer. Unsuitable conditions may include frozen
3 soil, freezing weather, saturated soil, standing water, high winds, heavy rains, and
4 high water levels. The ground shall be moist at the time of planting. All planting shall
5 be accomplished during the following periods:
6

7 1. Non-Irrigated Plant Material

8 Western Washington (West of the Cascade Mountain Crest) – October 1
9 to March 1.

10 Eastern Washington (East of the Cascade Mountain Crest) – October 1 to
11 November 15.
12

13 2. Irrigated Plant Material
14

15 In irrigated areas, plant material shall not be installed until the irrigation system
16 is fully operational and accepted by the Engineer. Trees and shrubs may be
17 planted in irrigated areas during the non-irrigated planting window before the
18 irrigation system is functional with the written concurrence of the Engineer only
19 if the irrigation system is guaranteed to be operational prior to the end of the
20 non-irrigated planting window.
21

22 **8-02.3(8)B Plant Installation**

23 The Contractor shall handle plant material in the following manner:
24

- 25 1. Root systems shall be kept covered and damp at all times. Plant material
26 shall be kept in containers until the time of planting.
27
- 28 2. Roots shall not be bunched, curled, twisted, or unreasonably bent when
29 placed in the planting hole. Bare root plant material shall be dormant at the
30 time of harvesting and planting. The root systems of all bare root plant
31 material shall be dipped in a slurry immediately prior to planting.
32
- 33 3. Plant material supplied in wrapped balls shall not be removed from the
34 wrapping until the time of planting at the planting location. The root system
35 of balled plant material shall be moist at the time of planting. Root balls
36 shall be loosened prior to planting. All burlap, baskets, string, wire and
37 other such materials shall be removed from the hole when planting balled
38 plants.
39
- 40 4. Plant cutting material shall be dormant at the time of cutting and planting.
41 All cuttings shall be installed immediately if buds begin to swell.
42
- 43 5. Plants shall be placed with the crown at the finished grade. In their final
44 position, plants shall have their top true root (not adventitious root) no more
45 than 1 inch below the soil surface, no matter where that root was located
46 in the original root ball or container. The backfill material, including
47 container and root ball soil, shall be thoroughly watered on the same day
48 that planting occurs regardless of season.
49

50 When installing plants, the Contractor shall dig planting holes three times the
51 diameter of the container or root ball size. Any glazed surface of the planting hole
52 shall be roughened prior to planting.
53

1 **8-02.3(8)C Pruning, Staking, Guying, and Wrapping**

2 Plants shall be pruned at the time of planting, only to remove minor broken or
3 damaged twigs, branches or roots. Pruning shall be performed with a sharp tool and
4 shall be done in such a manner as to retain or to encourage natural growth
5 characteristics of the plants. All other pruning shall be performed only after the
6 plants have been in the ground at least 1 year and when plants are dormant.
7

8 Trees shall only be staked when so noted in the Plans. Each tree shall be staked or
9 guyed before completion of the backfilling in accordance with the details shown in
10 the Plans.
11

12 Trees shall be wrapped when so noted in the Plans.
13

14 **8-02.3(9) Seeding, Fertilizing, and Mulching**

15 For all seed, the Contractor shall furnish the following documentation to the Engineer:
16

- 17 1. The state or provincial seed dealer license and endorsements.
18
19 2. Copies of Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) test results on
20 each lot of seed. Test results shall be within six months prior to the date of
21 application.
22

23 **8-02.3(9)A Dates for Application of Seed**

24 Unless otherwise allowed by the Engineer, the Contractor shall apply seed for
25 permanent erosion control during the following periods:
26

Western Washington ¹ (West of the Cascade Mountain Crest)	Eastern Washington (East of the Cascade Mountain Crest)
March 1 through May 15 September 1 through October 1	October 1 through November 15
¹ Seeding may be allowed outside these dates when allowed by the Engineer.	

27 All roadway excavation and embankment ground surfaces that are completed to
28 final grades shall be prepared and seeded during the first available seeding window.
29 When environmental conditions are not conducive to satisfactory results, the
30 Engineer may suspend the seeding Work until such time that the desired results are
31 likely to be obtained. If seeding is suspended, temporary erosion control methods
32 according to Section 8-01 shall be used to protect the bare soil until seeding
33 conditions improve.
34

35 **8-02.3(9)B Seeding and Fertilizing**

36 The Contractor shall prepare the seeding area in accordance with Section 8-
37 02.3(5)A and apply seed at the rate and mix specified in the Special Provisions. The
38 Contractor shall notify the Engineer within 5 days in advance of any seeding
39 operation and shall not begin the Work until areas prepared or designated for
40 seeding have been accepted. Following the Engineer's acceptance, seeding of the
41 accepted ground surfaces shall begin immediately.
42

43 Seeding shall not be done during windy weather or when the ground is frozen, or
44 excessively wet.
45
46

1 When seeding by hand, the seed shall be incorporated into the top ¼ inch of soil by
2 hand raking or other method that is allowed by the Engineer.
3

4 Seed applied as a separate operation using a hydroseeder shall have a tracer
5 added to visibly aid uniform application. The tracer shall be HECF Short-Term Mulch
6 applied at a rate of 200 to 250 pounds per acre and the tracer shall carry the
7 measured specified seeding rate.
8

9 **8-02.3(9)C Seeding with Fertilizers and Mulches**

10 When the Proposal includes any variation of seeding, fertilizing, and without
11 mulching, the seed and fertilizer shall be applied in one application followed by
12 mulching. West of the Cascade Mountains, seed, fertilizer, and mulch may be
13 completely applied in one application. East of the Cascades, seeding, fertilizing,
14 and mulching shall not be applied as a single application unless allowed by the
15 Engineer in writing prior to application. The fertilizing and mulching shall meet the
16 requirements of Sections 8-02.3(6) and 8-02.3(11).
17

18 **8-02.3(9)D Inspection**

19 Seeded areas will be inspected upon completion of seeding, fertilizing, and
20 mulching. The Work in any area will not be measured for payment until a uniform
21 distribution of the materials is accomplished at the specified rate. Areas that have
22 not received a uniform application of seed, fertilizer, and mulch at the specified rate,
23 as determined by the Engineer, shall be re-seeded, re-fertilized, or re-mulched prior
24 to payment for seeding within a designated area.
25

26 **8-02.3(9)E Protection and Care of Seeded Areas**

27 The Contractor shall install and establish a stable and weed free stand of grass as
28 specified within all designated permanent seeding areas. A stable stand of grass
29 shall meet the following requirements:
30

- 31 1. A dense and uniform canopy cover, 70% for Western Washington and 50%
32 for Eastern Washington, of specified species covers all seeded areas after
33 3 months of active growth following germination during the growing
34 season. Canopy cover is defined as the cover of living and vigorous grass
35 blades, leaves, and shoots of specified species. Volunteer species, weeds,
36 woody plants, or other undesirable vegetation shall not factor into the
37 canopy cover. Growth and establishment may require supplemental
38 irrigation to meet cover requirements.
- 39 2. Stand health is evident by vigorously growing planted species having a
40 uniform rich-green appearance and with no dead patches or major gaps of
41 growth. A stand of grass that displays rusting, wilting, stunted growth,
42 disease, yellowing or browning of leaves, or bare patches does not meet
43 the stand health requirement.
44
- 45 3. The Contractor shall establish a stable stand of grass free of all weeds,
46 non-specified grasses, and other undesirable vegetation. Weed control
47 shall be in accordance with the Weed and Pest Control Plan and occur on
48 a monthly basis during the establishment period and through the life of the
49 Contract.
50
- 51 4. Remove all trash, rocks, construction debris, and other obstructions that
52 may be detrimental to the continued establishment of future seeding.
53
54

1 In addition to the requirements of Section 1-07.13(1), restoration of eroded areas
2 including clean up, removal, and proper disposal of eroded material, filling and
3 raking of eroded areas with Topsoil Type A or fine compost, and re-application of
4 the specified seed, fertilizer, and mulch shall occur at no additional cost to the
5 Contracting Agency.
6

7 **8-02.3(10) Lawn Installation**

8 **8-02.3(10)A Dates and Conditions for Lawn Installation**

9 In irrigated areas, lawn installation shall not begin until the irrigation system
10 is fully operational.
11

12 Unless otherwise allowed by the Engineer, seeded lawn installation shall be
13 performed during the following time periods at the location shown:
14

Western Washington (West of the Cascade Mountain Crest)	Eastern Washington (East of the Cascade Mountain Crest)
March 1 through May 15 September 1 through October 1	October 1 through November 15
When irrigation system is operational March 1 through October 1	When irrigation system is operational March 1 through November 1

15 **8-02.3(10)B Lawn Seeding and Sodding**

16 The Contractor shall prepare the lawn area in accordance with Section 8-02.3(5)
17 and apply seed at the mix and rate of application as specified in the Special
18 Provisions.
19

20 The Contractor shall have the option of sodding in lieu of seeding for lawn
21 installation at no additional expense to the Contracting Agency. Seeding in lieu of
22 sodding will not be allowed.
23

24 Seed placed by hand shall be raked into the soil. Following raking, the seeded soil
25 shall be rolled with a smooth 50-pound roller. Sod strips shall be placed within 48
26 hours of being cut. Placement shall be without voids and have the end joints
27 staggered. Following placement, the sod shall be rolled with a smooth roller to
28 establish contact with the soil.
29

30 Barriers shall be erected, with warning signs where necessary, to preclude
31 pedestrian traffic access to the newly placed lawn during the establishment period.
32

33 **8-02.3(10)C Lawn Establishment**

34 Lawn establishment shall consist of caring for all new lawn areas within the limits of
35 the project.
36

37 The lawn establishment period shall begin immediately after the lawn seeding or
38 sodding has been accepted by the Engineer and shall extend to the end of four
39 mowings or 20 working days whichever is longer. The mowings shall be done in
40 accordance with Section 8-02.3(10)D.
41

42 During the lawn establishment period, the Contractor shall ensure the continuing
43 healthy growth of the turf. This care shall include keeping the project in a
44 presentable condition including, but not limited to, removal of litter, mowing,
45 trimming, removal of grass clippings, edging, fertilization, insecticide and fungicide
46

1 applications, weed control, watering, repairing the irrigation system, and repair and
2 reseeding all damaged areas.

3
4 Temporary barriers shall be removed only when directed by the Engineer.

5
6 All Work performed under lawn establishment shall comply with established turf
7 management practices.

8
9 Acceptance of lawn planting as specified will be based on a uniform stand of grass
10 and a uniform grade at the time of final inspection. The Contractor shall recultivate,
11 re-grade, reseed, and refertilize areas that are bare or have a poor stand of grass
12 or not having a uniform grade through any cause before final inspection at no
13 additional cost to the Contracting Agency.

14
15 **8-02.3(10)D Lawn Mowing**

16 Lawn mowing shall begin immediately after the lawn establishment period has been
17 accepted by the Engineer and shall extend to the end of the Contract or the first-
18 year plant establishment, whichever is last.

19
20 The Contractor shall accomplish the following minimum requirements:

- 21
22 1. Mow, trim, and edge as often as conditions dictate, at a minimum, once
23 per week between April and September. Maximum height of lawn shall not
24 exceed 3 inches. The cutting height shall be 2 inches. Cuttings, trimmings,
25 and edgings shall be disposed of off the project site. When the Engineer
26 allows the use of a mulching mower, trimmings may be left in place.
27
28 2. Water as often as conditions dictate depending on weather and soil
29 conditions.
30
31 3. Provide fertilizer, weed control, water, and other measures as necessary
32 to establish and maintain a healthy stand of grass.
33

34 **8-02.3(11) Mulch**

35 Mulches associated with seeding and planting shall be of the type specified in the
36 Special Provisions or as indicated in the Plans. The Contractor shall evenly apply mulch
37 at the rates indicated in the Plans. Mulches shall not be placed below the anticipated
38 water level of ditch slopes, pond bank slopes, and stream banks, or in areas of standing
39 or flowing water.

40
41 **8-02.3(11)A Mulch for Seeding Areas**

42 The Contractor shall furnish and evenly apply Hydraulically Applied Erosion Control
43 Product (HECP) Long Term Mulch at the rates indicated and in accordance with the
44 Manufacturer's specifications unless otherwise specified.

45
46 HECP Long Term Mulch shall be hydraulically applied at the rate of 3500 pounds
47 per acre with no more than 2000 pounds applied in any single lift. HECP mulch shall
48 not be used within the Ordinary High Water Mark.

49
50 Mulch sprayed on signs or sign Structures shall be removed the same day.

51
52 Areas not accessible by mulching equipment shall be mulched by accepted
53 hand methods.
54

1 HECP Long Term Mulch may be applied with seed and fertilizer west of the summit
2 of the Cascade Range. East of the summit of the Cascade Range, seed and
3 fertilizer shall be applied in a single application followed by the application of mulch.
4

5 **8-02.3(11)B Bark or Woodchip Mulch**

6 The Contractor shall apply bark or wood chip mulch of the type and depth specified
7 where shown in the Plans or as specified in the Special Provisions.
8

9 The Contractor shall complete final grading and placement/incorporation of soil
10 amendments within the planting area prior to placement of mulch. Areas receiving
11 bark mulch shall be bare soil or vegetation free before application, except where
12 trees and other plants are specifically identified in the Plans or designated by the
13 Engineer to be saved and protected.
14

15 Bark or wood chip mulch shall be placed to a uniform non-compacted depth of 3
16 inches over all planting areas unless otherwise specified. Mulch shall be feathered
17 to the base of the plant and 1 inch below the top of junction and valve boxes, curbs,
18 and pavement edges.
19

20 Any contamination of the mulch due to the Contractor's operations shall be
21 corrected to its former condition at no additional cost to the Contracting Agency.
22 Mulch placed to a thickness greater than specified shall be at no additional cost to
23 the Contracting Agency.
24

25 The Contractor shall keep plant material crowns, runners, and branches free of
26 mulch at all times.
27

28 **8-02.3(11)C Bark or Woodchip Mulch Rings**

29 The Contractor shall apply mulch rings around plants installed within existing
30 vegetation areas or within seeded areas as shown in the Plans. Bark or wood chip
31 mulch rings shall be applied to the surface of vegetation free amended soil in the
32 isolated plant locations where shown in the Plans or as specified in the Special
33 Provisions. Bark or wood chip mulch shall be placed to a uniform non-compacted
34 depth of 3 inches to a radius of 2 feet around all plants within interplanted plant
35 locations.
36

37 **8-02.3(12) Completion of Initial Planting**

38 Upon completion of the initial planting within a designated area, the Engineer will make
39 an inspection of all planting areas. The Engineer will notify the Contractor, in writing, of
40 any replacements or corrective action necessary to meet the plant installation
41 requirements. The Contractor shall replace all plants and associated materials rejected
42 or missing and correct unsatisfactory conditions.
43

44 Completion of the initial planting within a designated area includes the following
45 conditions:
46

- 47 1. 100 percent of each of the plant material categories are installed as shown in
48 the Plans.
- 49 2. Planting Area is cleaned up.
- 50 3. Repairs are completed, including but not limited to, full operation of the
51 irrigation system.
52
53
54

1 4. Mulch coverage is complete.

2
3 5. All weeds are controlled.

4
5 **8-02.3(13) Plant Establishment**

6 Plant establishment consists of caring for all plants and planting areas within the project
7 limits. The provisions of Sections 1-07.13(2) and 1-07.13(3) do not apply to this Section.

8
9 When the Proposal includes the bid item PSIFE____ (Plant Selection Including Plant
10 Establishment), that bid item includes one year of plant establishment Work. The first
11 year of plant establishment shall begin immediately upon written notification from the
12 Engineer of the completion of initial planting for the project. The first-year plant
13 establishment period shall be a minimum of one calendar year. The one calendar year
14 shall be extended an amount equal to any periods where the Contractor does not comply
15 with the plant establishment requirements and plan.

16
17 During the first-year plant establishment period, the Contractor shall perform all Work
18 necessary to ensure the resumption and continued growth of the transplanted material.
19 This Work shall include, but is not limited to, applying water, removing foreign, dead, or
20 rejected plant material, maintaining all planting areas in a weed-free condition, and
21 replacing all unsatisfactory plant material planted under the Contract. If plants are stolen
22 or damaged by the acts of others, the Contracting Agency will pay invoice cost only for
23 the replacement plants with no mark-up and the Contractor will be responsible for the
24 labor to install the replacement plants. Other weed control within the project limits but
25 outside of planting, lawn, or seeding areas shall be as specified in Section 8-02.3(3)C.

26
27 During the first year of plant establishment, the Contractor shall meet monthly or at an
28 agreed upon schedule with the Engineer for the purpose of joint inspection of the
29 planting material. The Contractor shall correct all unsatisfactory conditions identified by
30 the Engineer within a 10-day period immediately following the inspection. If plant
31 replacement is required, the Contractor shall, within the 10-day period, submit a plan
32 and schedule for the plant procurement and replacement to occur during the planting
33 period as designated in Section 8-02.3(8). At the end of the plant establishment period,
34 plants that do not show normal growth shall be replaced and all staking and guying that
35 remain on the project shall be removed unless otherwise allowed by the Engineer.

36
37 All automatic irrigation systems shall be operated fully automatic during the plant
38 establishment period and until final acceptance of the Contract. Payment for water used
39 to water in plants, or hand watering of plant material or lawn areas unless otherwise
40 specified, is the responsibility of the Contractor during the first-year plant
41 establishment period.

42
43 Subsequent year plant establishment periods shall begin immediately at the completion
44 of the preceding year's plant establishment period. Each subsequent plant
45 establishment period shall be one full calendar year in duration.

46
47 During the plant establishment period(s) after the first year plant establishment, the Work
48 necessary for the continued healthy and vigorous growth of all plants material shall be
49 performed as directed by the Engineer.

50
51 Payment for water used to water plants during the subsequent year(s) of plant
52 establishment will be paid under the plant establishment item.

1 **8-02.3(14) Plant Replacement**

2 The Contractor shall be responsible for growing or arrange to provide sufficient plants
3 for replacement of all plant material rejected through first-year plant establishment. All
4 replacement plant material shall be inspected and accepted by the Engineer prior to
5 installation. All rejected plant material shall be replaced with acceptable plants meeting
6 the specifications and installed according to the requirements of this Section at dates
7 allowed by the Engineer.
8

9 All replacement plants shall be of the same species as the plants they replace and meet
10 the requirements of Section 9-14.8 unless otherwise allowed by the Engineer. Plants
11 may vary in size reflecting one season of growth should the Contractor elect to hold plant
12 material under nursery conditions for an additional year to serve as replacement plants.
13 Replacement plant material larger than specified in the Plans shall meet the applicable
14 section requirements of the ASNS for container class, ball size, spread, and branching
15 characteristics.
16

17 **8-02.3(15) Bioengineering**

18 Bioengineering consists of using plant materials for the purpose of streambank or
19 earthen slope construction and surface stabilization. This Work may include installing
20 woody plant cuttings in various forms as well as part of streambank or earthen slope
21 construction.
22

23 **8-02.3(15)A Fascines**

24 Live fascines shall be constructed of live and dead cuttings bundled together with a
25 diameter of 8 to 18 inches. Live cuttings shall be the species shown in the Plans.
26 Dead branches may be cuttings from any woody, non-invasive plant native to the
27 project area. Dead branches may be placed within the live fascine and on the side
28 exposed to the air. Live branches shall be placed in contact with the soil along their
29 entire length. Each live fascine must contain a minimum of eight live branches. Dead
30 branches shall constitute no more than 40 percent of the total fascine content.
31

32 The total length of each live fascine shall be a minimum of 5 feet. Branches shall
33 be bundled into log-like forms and bound with biodegradable twine spaced at 1-foot
34 intervals along the entire length of the live fascine. Live fascines shall be installed
35 horizontally in a trench whose depth shall be ½ the diameter of the live fascine.
36 Secure the live fascine with live stakes 3 feet in length and ¾ inch in diameter placed
37 at 18-inch intervals. A minimum of three live stakes shall be used per fascine. The
38 live stakes shall be driven through the live fascine vertically into the slope. The ends
39 of live fascines shall be woven together so that no gap remains between the two
40 sections of the live fascine.
41

42 Prior to being covered with soil, the fascine shall be thoroughly watered. Once the
43 fascine is covered with 6 inches of soil, the soil covering the fascine shall be
44 thoroughly watered.
45

46 When used to remedy erosion areas, live fascines shall extend a minimum of two
47 feet beyond the visible area of erosion and soil disturbance. The locations for live
48 fascines and live stake rows shall be identified in the field for review and acceptance
49 by the Engineer. The Engineer may require adjustment of fascine locations prior to
50 installation in order to best accomplish the intended functions.
51

52 Plant replacement during plant establishment for "PSIPE Live Fascine" will be
53 required for any section void of live shoots for a length of 3 feet or more.
54 Replacement shall consist of installing live stakes, spaced 1 foot apart above the

1 fascine within the area void of live shoots. Live stakes shall be of the same species
2 as the live fascine and shall have a minimum length of 3 feet and a minimum
3 diameter of ¾ inch. The requirements of Section 8-02.3(8) apply to PSIFE Live
4 Fascine.

5
6 **8-02.3(15)B Brush Mattress**

7 Live brush mattress shall be constructed of live branch cuttings, live poles, jute rope
8 and topsoil. The live cuttings and live poles shall be from the plant species
9 designated in the Plans. Live branch cuttings shall be placed with the cut ends
10 oriented down slope as shown in the Plans. Cuttings shall overlap from side to side
11 and from top to bottom as each layer is constructed. The live branches in each
12 succeeding upper layer shall overlap the adjacent lower layer by a minimum of 6
13 inches. A maximum of 20 percent of the branches may be dead branches, but the
14 live branches shall be distributed evenly to provide even rooting and growth over
15 the entire area of the brush mattress.

16
17 The Contractor shall anchor the live brush mattress to the slope using stakes and
18 jute rope as shown in the Plans. Initially, the stakes shall be installed to protrude
19 above the live brush mattress. The Contractor shall attach the jute rope to the stakes
20 and tighten the rope by tamping the stakes further into the bank, pulling the live
21 brush mattress tight against the soil surface. The Contractor shall cover the live
22 brush mattress with sufficient stockpiled topsoil to ensure good soil contact with the
23 live plant material.

24
25 Plant replacement during plant establishment for "PSIFE Live Brush Mattress" will
26 be required for any section void of live shoots for an area of 25 square feet or more.
27 Replacement shall consist of installing live stakes, spaced 3 feet apart in a triangular
28 pattern within the area void of live shoots. Live stakes shall be of the same species
29 as the live brush mattress and shall have a minimum length of 3 feet and a minimum
30 diameter of ¾ inch. The requirements of Section 8-02.3(8) apply to PSIFE Brush
31 Mattress.

32
33 **8-02.3(15)C Brush Layer**

34 Brush layers shall be constructed of live branch cuttings, randomly mixed, from the
35 plant species listed under the brush layer heading in the Plans. The number of
36 branches required will vary depending on the average branch diameter and layer
37 thickness.

38
39 Brush layers shall be placed in a trench dug at a 45 degree incline into the slope or
40 stream bank. Two-thirds to three-fourths of the length of the live branches shall be
41 buried. Soil shall be firmly tamped in place. Succeeding layers shall be spaced as
42 detailed in the Plans. Brush layer placed in stream banks shall be angled
43 downstream.

44
45 Brush layers may include plant establishment when designated as PSIFE Brush
46 Layer. Plant replacement for PSIFE Brush Layer will be required for each section
47 void of live shoots for a continuous distance of 3 feet or more. The requirements of
48 Section 8-02.3(8) apply to PSIFE Brush Layer.

49
50 **8-02.3(16) Roadside Maintenance Under Construction**

51 When the Contract includes the item, Roadside Maintenance Under Construction, this
52 Work includes roadside mowing and ditch maintenance, and noxious weed control
53 outside of planting areas according to Section 8-02.3(3)C.
54

1 **8-02.3(16)A Roadside Mowing**

2 The Contractor shall mow designated roadside grass areas to the limits designated
3 by the Engineer. Roadside mowing is limited to slopes not steeper than 3(H) to 1(V).
4

5 The Contractor shall mow according to the following requirements:
6

- 7 1. Trim around traffic equipment, structures, planting areas, or other features
8 extending above ground preceding or simultaneously with each mowing.
9
10 2. Maintain grass between 4 and 12 inches in height.
11
12 3. Operate mowing equipment with suitable guards to prevent throwing rocks
13 or debris onto the traveled way or off of the Contracting Agency property.
14 Power driven equipment shall not cause ruts, deformation, and
15 compaction of the vegetated soil.
16

1. Compliance with Regulations

Prefabricated items specifically produced for public works projects that are prefabricated in a county other than the county wherein the public works project is to be completed, the wage for the offsite prefabrication shall be the applicable prevailing wage for the county in which the actual prefabrication takes place.

It is the manufacturer of the prefabricated product to verify that the correct county wage rates are applied to work they perform.

(The definition of "locality" in RCW [39.12.010\(2\)](#) contains the phrase "wherein the physical work is being performed." The department interprets this phrase to mean the actual work site.

**Washington State Department of Labor and Industries
Policy Statements
(Regarding Production and Delivery of Gravel, Concrete, Asphalt, etc.)**

WAC 296-127-018 Agency filings affecting this section

Coverage and exemptions of workers involved in the production and delivery of gravel, concrete, asphalt, or similar materials.

(1) The materials covered under this section include but are not limited to: Sand, gravel, crushed rock, concrete, asphalt, or other similar materials.

(2) All workers, regardless of by whom employed, are subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they perform any or all of the following functions:

(a) They deliver or discharge any of the above-listed materials to a public works project site:

(i) At one or more point(s) directly upon the location where the material will be incorporated into the project; or

(ii) At multiple points at the project; or

(iii) Adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation of those materials.

(b) They wait at or near a public works project site to perform any tasks subject to this section of the rule.

(c) They remove any materials from a public works construction site pursuant to contract requirements or specifications (e.g., excavated materials, materials from demolished structures, clean-up materials, etc.).

(d) They work in a materials production facility (e.g., batch plant, borrow pit, rock quarry, etc.) which is established for a public works project for the specific, but not necessarily exclusive, purpose of supplying materials for the project.

(e) They deliver concrete to a public works site regardless of the method of incorporation.

(f) They assist or participate in the incorporation of any materials into the public works project.

(3) All travel time that relates to the work covered under subsection (2) of this section requires the payment of prevailing wages. Travel time includes time spent waiting to load, loading, transporting, waiting to unload, and delivering materials. Travel time would include all time spent in travel in support of a public works project whether the vehicle is empty or full. For example, travel time spent returning to a supply source to obtain another load of material for use on a public works site or returning to the public works site to obtain another load of excavated material is time spent in travel that is subject to prevailing wage. Travel to a supply source, including travel from a public works site, to obtain materials for use on a private project would not be travel subject to the prevailing wage.

(4) Workers are not subject to the provisions of chapter 39.12 RCW when they deliver materials to a stockpile.

(a) A "stockpile" is defined as materials delivered to a pile located away from the site of incorporation such that the stockpiled materials must be physically moved from the stockpile and transported to another location on the project site in order to be incorporated into the project.

(b) A stockpile does not include any of the functions described in subsection (2)(a) through (f) of this section; nor does a stockpile include materials delivered or distributed to multiple locations upon the project site; nor does a stockpile include materials dumped at the place of incorporation, or adjacent to the location and coordinated with the incorporation.

(5) The applicable prevailing wage rate shall be determined by the locality in which the work is performed. Workers subject to subsection (2)(d) of this section, who produce such materials at an off-site facility shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the off-site facility is located. Workers subject to subsection (2) of this section, who deliver such materials to a public works project site shall be paid the applicable prevailing wage rates for the county in which the public works project is located.

Overtime Codes

Overtime calculations are based on the hourly rate actually paid to the worker. On public works projects, the hourly rate must be not less than the prevailing rate of wage minus the hourly rate of the cost of fringe benefits actually provided for the worker.

1. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
 - B. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - C. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All other overtime hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

The first ten (10) hours worked on Saturdays and the first ten (10) hours worked on a fifth calendar weekday in a four-ten hour schedule, shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked in excess of ten (10) hours per day Monday through Saturday and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - H. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions or equipment breakdown) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked Monday through Saturday over twelve (12) hours and all hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - I. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall also be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - J. The first two (2) hours after eight (8) regular hours Monday through Friday and the first ten (10) hours on Saturday shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked over ten (10) hours Monday through Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - K. All hours worked on Saturdays and Sundays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - M. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days if work is lost due to inclement weather conditions) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.
 - N. All hours worked on Saturdays (except makeup days) shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

All hours worked over twelve (12) hours Monday through Saturday, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. When holiday falls on Saturday or Sunday, the day before Saturday, Friday, and the day after Sunday, Monday, shall be considered the holiday and all work performed shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

Work performed in excess of eight (8) hours of straight time per day, or ten (10) hours of straight time per day when four ten (10) hour shifts are established, or forty (40) hours of straight time per week, Monday through Friday, or outside the normal shift, and all work on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. All work performed after 6:00 pm Saturday to 5:00 am Monday and Holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. - H. All work performed on Sundays between March 16th and October 14th and all Holidays shall be compensated for at two (2) times the regular rate of pay. Work performed on Sundays between October 15th and March 15th shall be compensated at one and one half (1-1/2) times the regular rate of pay.
- I. All hours worked on Saturdays shall be paid at one and one-half times the hourly rate of wage. In the event the job is down due to weather conditions during a five day work week (Monday through Friday,) or a four day-ten hour work week (Tuesday through Friday,) then Saturday may be worked as a voluntary make-up day at the straight time rate. However, Saturday shall not be utilized as a make-up day when a holiday falls on Friday. After an employee has worked eight (8) hours at an applicable overtime rate, all additional hours shall be at the applicable overtime rate until such time as the employee has had a break of eight (8) hours or more. When an employee returns to work without at least eight (8) hours time off since their previous shift, all such time shall be a continuation of shift and paid at the applicable overtime rate until he/she shall have the eight (8) hours rest period.

4. ALL HOURS WORKED IN EXCESS OF EIGHT (8) HOURS PER DAY OR FORTY (40) HOURS PER WEEK SHALL BE PAID AT ONE AND ONE-HALF TIMES THE HOURLY RATE OF WAGE.
- A. All hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage. All hours worked on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall be paid at double the hourly rate of wage.

All hours worked over twelve (12) hours in a day and all hours worked on Sunday and Holidays shall be paid at two (2) times the straight time rate of pay.

- U. Workers on hazmat projects receive additional hourly premiums as follows – Class A Suit: \$2.00, Class B Suit: \$1.50, And Class C Suit: \$1.00. Workers performing underground work receive an additional \$0.40 per hour for any and all work performed underground, including operating, servicing and repairing of equipment. The premium for underground work shall be paid for the entire shift worked. Workers who work suspended by a rope or cable receive an additional \$0.50 per hour. The premium for work suspended shall be paid for the entire shift worked. Workers who do “pioneer” work (break open a cut, build road, etc.) more than one hundred fifty (150) feet above grade elevation receive an additional \$0.50 per hour.

8. V. In addition to the hourly wage and fringe benefits, the following depth and enclosure premiums shall be paid. The premiums are to be calculated for the maximum depth and distance into an enclosure that a diver reaches in a day. The premiums are to be paid one time for the day and are not used in calculating overtime pay.

Depth premiums apply to depths of fifty feet or more. Over 50' to 100' - \$2.00 per foot for each foot over 50 feet. Over 101' to 150' - \$3.00 per foot for each foot over 101 feet. Over 151' to 220' - \$4.00 per foot for each foot over 220 feet. Over 221' - \$5.00 per foot for each foot over 221 feet.

Enclosure premiums apply when divers enter enclosures (such as pipes or tunnels) where there is no vertical ascent and is measured by the distance travelled from the entrance. 25' to 300' - \$1.00 per foot from entrance. 300' to 600' - \$1.50 per foot beginning at 300'. Over 600' - \$2.00 per foot beginning at 600'.

- W. Meter Installers work on single phase 120/240V self-contained residential meters. The Lineman/Groundmen rates would apply to meters not fitting this description.

- X. Workers on hazmat projects receive additional hourly premiums as follows - Class A Suit: \$2.00, Class B Suit: \$1.50, Class C Suit: \$1.00, and Class D Suit: \$0.50. Special Shift Premium: Basic hourly rate plus \$2.00 per hour.

When due to conditions beyond the control of the Employer or when an owner (not acting as the contractor), a government agency or the contract specifications requires that work can only be performed outside the normal 5 am to 6pm shift, then the special shift premium will be applied to the basic hourly rate. When an employee works on a special shift, they shall be paid a special shift premium for each hour worked unless they are in OT or Double-time status. (For example, the special shift premium does not waive the overtime requirements for work performed on Saturday or Sunday.)
