Evidence and Property Unit

This unit maintains the physical integrity and control of evidentiary items in the custody of the Grant County Sheriff's Office.

The Sheriff's Office has one full-time Evidence Specialist, Tracy Williams, working in the property room. Civil Specialists Theresa Sheets provides a assistance to the Evidence and Property Unit by helping to organize and improve management of seized items.

The main objectives of the Evidence and Property Unit are:

- Provide safe and physical integrity of property and evidence items for temporary and permanent custody, and
- Maintain a continuous permanent record showing a chain-of-custody signature log of all items under Property Room control.

Some of the duties include but are not limited to:

- The control, transmission, and receipt of evidentiary items required for forensic analysis by the Washington State Crime Laboratory entities.
- The introduction of evidentiary items into Superior and District Courts.
- The placement of legal items for public auction for those items unclaimed or seized by competent authority.
- To have direct contact with individuals about property that is authorized to be returned.
- To dispose of all evidentiary/property items upon completion of criminal court proceedings when authorized by competent authority.

Reserve Deputies

Grant County Reserve Deputy Sheriffs are volunteer law enforcement officers who assist regular deputies in the performance of their duties. This includes answering emergency calls, rendering aid, making arrests, and testifying in court. Reserve Deputy Sheriffs wear the same uniforms and use the same equipment as their full-time counterparts.

- 15 Reserve Deputies volunteered 4575 hours protecting citizens.
- Reserve Deputies attended 233 hours of training, issued 400 citations and infractions, gave 412 warnings, made 72 arrests, and were assigned to 851 incidents.

Honor Guard

- The Grant County Sheriff's Honor Guard is a ceremonial unit dedicated to upholding the highest values and traditions of the men and women of law enforcement. Officers of the Honor Guard are committed to representing Grant County and the law enforcement family, both locally and nationally.
- The Honor Guard honors our fallen officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice. They remain ready to serve at the direction of the Sheriff and participate at various local, state and national events. The Honor Guard is civically minded and remembers our military veterans, as well as individuals and organizations that are dedicated to public service.
- The Honor Guard members are Cpl. Darrik Gregg, Dep. Larry Sanchez, Corrections Officer Brian Rogers and Corrections Officer Kevin Pennel.

Special Operations Division

Training

- 6549 hours of training completed by patrol, corrections, administration and clerical support staff.

Regional Reserve Officer Academy

The regional reserve academy started on November 1st, 2012 and completed on April 11th, 2013. We began with 9 students and graduated 4. This was the first online reserve academy in Washington State's history. The online portion was provided by the Wenatchee Valley College. There were over 300 hours of instruction during the academy.

Gorge Amphitheater Events Unit

- Fourteen separate event days at the Gorge between May 25 and Sept. 22 in 2012, which hosted a combined total of nearly 262,500 tickets sold with an average of 18,750 per show day. Concerts included performers Dave Matthews Band, Sasquatch Festival, Paradiso, Jason Mraz, Summer Jam, Watershed Country Festival and Journey.
- 264 calls for service for units assigned to the Gorge Events Unit. Offenses ranged from

alcohol and drug offenses to assaults and driving offenses.

- 566 infractions and citations were issued.

Registered Sex Offender Address and Residency Verification Program

The Sex Offender Registration & Tracking Unit is responsible for tracking, locating, verifying and recording 299 offenders who live within Grant County.

Deputy Sheriff Jay Atwood was assigned to track and monitor the whereabouts of registered sex offenders in Grant County. Deputy Atwood kept tabs on:

Most offenders live in the Moses Lake area. Citizens can access information on where sex offenders live in Grant County by visiting the Offender Watch website, www.sheriffalerts.com/wa/grant.

RCW 9A.44.135 lays out the process and requires the Chief Law Enforcement officer of the County to locate and verify the residency of a registered sex offender within their jurisdiction. This also includes kidnapping offenders if required to register.

These requirements are codified in RCW 36.28A and include that address verifications are based on the following:

- Level 1 offenders: every 12 months;
- Level 2 offenders: every 6 months; and
- Level 3 offenders: every 3 months.

Search and Rescue

Search and Rescue volunteers provided valuable assistance in searching for missing persons and utilizing underwater diving skills to rescue and recover persons from Grant County's many waterways.

- SAR volunteered 334 hours, responded to 3 drownings, 3 missing persons, and recovered 6 stolen vehicles in the water.

Mounted Posse

- The Mounted Posse volunteer members helped at several area crime scenes and uncovered several pieces of crucial evidence which assisted with successful prosecutions.
- The Mounted Posse assisted with the search for Dan Toya from Moses Lake.
- The Mounted Posse provided crowd control at the Gorge and the Grant County Fair, and participated in several community parades, such as Coulee City, Ephrata Sage and Sun, Moses Lake Moon Light and Quincy Farmer Consumer Awareness Day.
- The Mounted Posse attended 16 hours of specialized training with Jim Barrett, a professional law enforcement mounted patrol trainer from California.
- Additionally, the Posse offered riders from all over four "play days" or horse shows a year for riders ages 1 to 100. The high point prize for the four shows are belt buckles which are donated by citizens and merchants of Grant County and Posse members as well. Ten belt buckles were awarded to the yearend high point winners.
- The Posse logged in 742 hours of volunteer time.

Marine Unit

Grant County Marine Unit Deputies Jon Melvin and Darryl Hudson are active all year patrolling the waters of Grant County. The Marine Unit routinely responds to boaters and persons in distress. The Marine Deputies are specially trained in the following areas:

- Boat Handling
- Marine Law Enforcement and Education
- Basic/Advanced Boat Collision Investigation
- Instructors in Boating Safety
- Personal Watercraft Swift Water Rescue

The experience and training of the Marine Unit provides a valuable 24 hour service to the citizens and those that visit the waters of Grant County.

The Marine Unit patrols the waters of Grant County to promote boating safety and to enforce Grant County Ordinance (6.08) and Washington State Boating Laws RCW 79A.60.

Interagency Narcotics Enforcement Team

Staffed in 2012 by detectives from Grant County Sheriff's Office, Ephrata Police Department, Quincy Police Department, Moses Lake Police and Department and Washington State Patrol.

INET targets street gangs and drug trafficking organizations. One detective is responsible for focusing on the gang intelligence. Our hope is to get more personnel involved with tracking gang members.

One of the major 2011 operations in which INET was involved occurred this summer. In cooperation with the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, 24 search warrants were executed in Eastern Washington, several of them in Grant County. Those raids resulted in 25 federal indictments and \$400,000 in seized funds. INET has requested asset sharing with the DEA.

School Resource Officer

- Deputy Larry Sanchez works in the Wahluke School District campuses in Mattawa, ensuring schools are safe and serving as a direct line of communication between students, teachers, parents and administrators.
- Deputy Sanchez has taught four fourth grade classes (about 60 students) this year in his GREAT (Gang Resistance Education and Training) program.
- SRO provides law enforcement presence for extracurricular activities such as football games, basketball games and graduation.
- SRO is a member of the state Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction's gang task force, assisting in gang, cyberbullying and computer safety policies for schools throughout the state of Washington.

The SRO helps students and educators in a variety of ways, such as

- Coaching and counseling of students ranging from ages of 8 to 19,
- Teaching the GREAT program Gang Resistance and Education/Great Families Program,
- Providing parents with education on social skills and how to communicate better with their children, and
- Providing gang education to parents, teachers, administrators and staff.

Off Road Vehicle Unit

The Grant County Sheriff's Office is proud to once again be participating with the Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) in the Non-highway and Off-Road Vehicle Activities program (NOVA).

The Sheriff's Office was awarded two grants in the summer of 2011 that provide partial funding for our ORV program. These grants, as awarded through the RCO, were awarded in two different classifications: one for Education and Enforcement (E&E) and the other for Maintenance and Operations (M&O). The grants are for a 24 month period beginning July 1st, 2011 and running through June 30th, 2013. The grant process is competitive and requires renewal applications and considerations every two years.

The E&E grant was awarded in the amount of \$200,000 (over the course of two years) with Grant County supplying an additional \$210,600 in funding from the current expense fund (match). The total project funding is \$410,600.

The M&O grant was awarded in the amount of \$49,000 (over the course of two years) with Grant County supplying an additional \$48,600 in funding from the current expense fund (match). The total project funding is \$97,600

The total grant dollars funding our operation is \$249,000 with an additional \$259,200 coming from the County's current expense fund (match). The overall funding of the project comes to \$508,200.

About the RCO and the NOVA program

The Washington State Recreation and Conservation Office is a small state agency that manages grant programs to create outdoor recreation opportunities, protect the best of the state's wildlife habitat and farmland, and help return salmon from near extinction.

The Non-highway and Off-road Vehicle Activities program provides funding to develop and manage recreation opportunities for such activities as cross-country skiing, hiking, horseback riding, mountain bicycling, hunting, fishing, sightseeing, motorcycling, and riding all-terrain and four-wheel drive vehicles.

Funding Source

Funding comes from a portion of the gasoline tax and off-road vehicle use permits.

Eligible Projects

Maintenance and operation for open off-road vehicle riding areas, trails, trail heads, day-use areas, campgrounds, off-road vehicle sports parks and intensive use areas, support structures and facilities, snow removal and trail grooming for non-snowmobile recreation, water access sites that serve primarily non-motorized activities, maintenance and operation of facilities provided that the primary management objective of the facility is clearly identified as non-highway road, non-motorized, or motorized off-road vehicle recreation.

Education and Enforcement

Education and enforcement activities may include field contacts with NOVA users and groups to encourage responsible recreational behaviors, providing information and education materials for public distribution, and protecting resources and facilities. Employing law enforcement staff and purchasing some equipment, both of which must be dedicated to NOVA enforcement and education activities, are a few of the eligible projects.

Corrections Division

Maximum Security Jail

The Grant County Jail has been operating in its present location since January 1986 and is a 188 bed facility.

Work Release Center

In 1999 the Work Release Center opened to provide housing for minimum to medium security post-sentence inmates, and to allow local courts the option of work release as a sentencing alternative. The Grant County Work Release Center is a 100 bed, medium security facility.

Inmate education is emphasized at the facility. Inmates who do not possess a high school diploma or Generalized Education Diploma (GED) are required to attend GED preparation classes held at the facility twice a week.

The facility also encourages inmates with diplomas to prepare for college and/or vocational courses by attending GED classes. For these inmates entry into the GED class is a little more difficult. Prior to being accepted into the class the inmate must verbalize in a 500 word essay on why they should be allowed in the course and what their future plans are. Upon review of the essay by the GED teacher and facility sergeant acceptance into the class is either granted or denied.

Inmate work programs are also emphasized at the facility. The following projects are examples of work programs supervised by staff:

- **Work Crew:** Inmates are utilized for permanently assigned and temporary details where inmate labor allows governmental or non-profit agencies to save or maximize tax payer

dollars. Examples of temporary details are landscaping, weed abatement, painting, brush removal and moving of office furniture.

- **Litter Crew:** In a cooperative effort with the Department of Ecology and Grant County Public Works, inmates perform litter pick-up and clean-up of illegal dumpsites from public lands throughout Grant County. Grant funds in the amount of \$30,000 to \$32,000 annually help fund this program which has collected over 550,000 pounds of litter.


Permanent assignments are:
