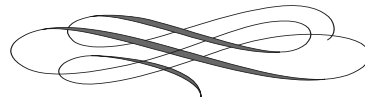

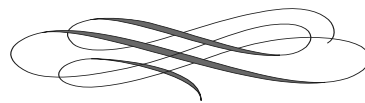

Program Overview

The Grant County Drug Court Program is a “court-supervised”, comprehensive treatment program for non-violent, adult drug/property felony offenders whose crime is related to or caused by drug and/or alcohol addiction.

The Mission of the Drug Court Program is to enhance public safety and break cycle of drugs/alcohol and crime by providing evidence-based treatment services, strict judicial supervision and accountability and effective drug/alcohol monitoring to chemically addicted offenders so they can become responsible and productive members in the community.

The primary goal of the program is to support participants to achieve healthy, positive, and satisfying lifestyles through total abstinence from alcohol and drugs. The program is designed to promote responsibility and accountability through opportunities to change thinking, attitudes, and behavior.

Drug Court Goals

- ❖ Reduce the cycle of crime and drug use by providing evidence-based treatment to drug-addicted criminal offenders.
- ❖ Require strict accountability through frequent in-person court hearings and intensive monitoring.
- ❖ Provide cost effective treatment services that will improve program completion rates and reduce recidivism.
- ❖ Educate the public about the benefits of providing court-supervised treatment to drug/alcohol offenders to create a safer community.
- ❖ Reduce thinking errors, abstain from drug/alcohol use, and criminal behaviors.
- ❖ Reduce emergency room, other medical costs, and the use of public assistance.
- ❖ Reduce court, jail and prison and overcrowding and associated costs in the criminal justice system.
- ❖ Require completion of education.
- ❖ Require W-2 tax paying employment.
- ❖ Develop partnerships among drug courts, public agencies, and community-based organizations to generate local support and enhance overall program effectiveness.

Eligibility Criteria/Admission

- ❖ Persons may be eligible for the program if they are charged with a non-violent felony offense.
- ❖ The Deputy Prosecuting Attorney determines eligibility based upon current/pending and prior charges.
- ❖ A defense attorney advises the offenders of their options.
- ❖ The Judge asks them if they want to be considered for the Drug Court Program.
- ❖ If the defendant chooses the Drug Court option, the Program Coordinator conducts a Suitability Interview with them.
- ❖ If recommended for the Program, they will sign a Contract, receive a Participant Handbook orientation, and will be given a treatment schedule.
- ❖ They are assigned to a primary counselor who completes the Initial Individualized Service Plan.
- ❖ Participants return to Court for progress review hearings before the Drug Court Judge.
